öperation of Ted Malone of New York City the NFL will sponsor this year a contest in Poetry Reading. Mr. Malone, who for the past several years has had one of the most universally popular programs on the Columbia network and who is now on the Mutual network will be in Wooster to conduct the contests. Many NFL members also know him as Poetry Editor of Pictorial.

Winner on Mutual Network

The preliminaries in the contests will be held on Tuesday. Each contestant will read a short passage of poetry rfom a list selected by Mr. Malone. In the final contest on Wednesday morning each contestant will read one passage from sight and another for which he has been given time to peruse. The winner will be presented as trophy a pair of bookends by Mr. Malone and will then appear with Mr. Malone on his Mutual network program originating at Cleveland that afternoon at 2:30 Central Standard Time. Mr. Malone will be at our banquet on Tuesday evening and may consent to read a bit for the quests then.

Also to any other high school student who has won first place in any interscholastic contest in Poetry Reading conducted along approximately the plan herein outlined. Entry fees will be purely nominal; \$1 for regular tournament contestants: \$2.50 for others.

America Interested in Poetry

The widespread interest in poetry on the part of the average American in a supposedly fastliving age is not generally known. Yet for several years Mr. Malone's 15 minute program of poetry has been one of the most popular on the network. As many as 2,000 original poems are submitted to him a day from which to choose for radio reading. The Executive Council is indebted to Professor P. Casper Harvey, Missouri State Honorary Member of NFL, for introducing Mr. Malone to us and suggesting the idea of a national contest as herein announced.

Register for National

Registration for the National Tournament should be filed as early as possible. "Checking in" at Wooster will be much quicker if registration was completed by mail before hand.

Registration must be on the official blank and signed by principal or superintendent. Blanks are available from any national officer, district chairman, or director of your state league.

Bills Passed May Appear in the Congressional Record of the United States Congress

Further encouragement and sup- a clear majority, with 15 Repubport of the National Student Congress sponsored by the NFL is contained in a letter from United States Senator F. Ryan Duffy of Wisconsin who states he will endeavor to have printed in the Congressoinal Record some of the bills passed by the student legislators at Wooster. The Senator writes: "The program is indeed a most commendable one, and would like to be of some little assistance in gaining the desired recognition through the insertion in the Congressional Record of some of the bills to be introduced by the participants in this tournament. With some explanation to the Seante as to the reason for the request, I am hopeful that it will not be objected to.'

The youthful Congressmen will now have a special reason for framing thoughtfully sound proposals for our national welfare and for using effectively every art of speech to gain acceptance for their measures. Success will be accorded a recognition more distinctive than any trophy or medaltheir proposals under their own names in the Congressional Record of the United States.

President of Tournament Veterans Is Triple Threat Man

T. M. Beaird of Oklahoma Will Have Three Roles in National Tournament at Wooster

Director of the National Student Congress, President of the Veterans' Club, and sponsor of the Coaches' Contests are the three jobs laid on the broad shoulders of capable T. M. Beaird of Oklahoma University. In the first named capacity he will exercise general supervision of the Student Congress and see to it that it moves faster toward achievement than the National Congress in Washington just before adjournment.

As president of NFL Tournament Veterans-those who have attended previous national tournaments, Mr. Beaird will have charge of the program at the Tuesday evening banquet. In this connectoin he will also exercise his third function, that of sponsor of the coaches' contest.

Don't Hide Your Talents

That is the admonition of Mr. Beaird to NFL coaches coming to the Wooster National. This means in other words, enter the two contests for coaches. The first is on the subject, "A Good After-Dinner Speech." The second is a contest in Humorous Reading or Declamation.

For years now we have been talking about using better subject matter in our contests in Humorous Declamation. Here is an open challenge to show NFL students and coaches just what is meant by that term and that good literature contains a lot of delightful humor that will win contests just as will



the ordinary, sometimes called 'slap-stick" variety.

The first place winners only in these two contests will be permitted to entertain the guests at the second of the two big NFL tournament banquets. Gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded in each division. Registration may be made for either contest at Wooster on Sunday afternoon and evening, May 1, but preparation should begin at once and continue until the gold medal is in your possession and the banquet audience has been properly electrified by the scintilating humor of your speech or rendition.
