ment events. Also to any other high school student who has won first place in any interscholastic contest in Poetry Reading conducted along approximately the plan herein outlined. Entry fees will be purely nominal; $\$ 1$ for regular tournament contestants; $\$ 2.50$ for others.

The widespread interest in poetry on the part of the average American in a supposedly fastliving age is not generally known. Success will be accorded a recognition more distinctive than any trophy or medaltheir proposals under their own names in the Congressional Record of the United States

the ordinary, sometimes called slap-stick" variety.
The first place winners only in these two contests will be permitted to entertain the guests at the second of the two big NFL tournament banquets. Gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded in each division. Registration may be made for either contest at Wooster on Sunday afternoon and evening, May 1, but preparation should begin at once and continue until the gold medal is in your possession and the banquet audience has been properly electrified by the scintilating humor of your speech or rendition.
