The major rule changes for the NFL district and national tournaments are in Interpretation events:

*No student may enter more than <u>one</u> interp event at the district tournament. This means the past practice of doubling in Duo and HI or Duo and DI at district is no longer allowed.

Although this was a popular practice, it led to a great deal of controversy when a member of a Duo team, who also qualified in DI or HI, chose to attend nationals in the single event, thus stranding the partner, who then complained to parents and school officials.

Unfortunately it is not possible to allow Duo and single interp double entry at nationals since there is not enough time in a 2-hour block for a duo team, one entered in DI and one in HI to make it to those different performances, especially since different events are held in separate buildings. There are not enough rooms available to hold Duo during the debate time slot. To switch Duo with L/D Debate would really create a problem since the largest number of double entries are L/D and Extemp. In the 1991 Nationals Extemp & L/D were in the same time slot and this schedule was changed due to scheduling problems and coach and student dissatisfaction.

*A cutting must be from a single work of literature: <u>one</u> novel, <u>one</u> short story, <u>one</u> play, or <u>one</u> poem.

This rule applies only to HI, DI, and Duo <u>not</u> Prose or Poetry. By limiting a cutting to a single literary work, the confusion over the "single source" rule is ended. Under the old "single source" standard, students using an anthology (a single source) sometimes would mix different literary works together in a cutting. The "single work of literature" standard insures a cutting

will be drawn from only one play, story, novel or poem.

Some new rules also were adopted for the national tournament.

*At nationals <u>only</u>, student ranks in speech rounds will be recorded as given by judges. Ranks of "6" and "7" will no longer be changed to "5". The confusion surrounding what scores were need to "break" and which student won will be eliminated by counting actual ranks. <u>But</u> a six and a seven will earn the same number of NFL points as a five.

*Each policy debate <u>team</u> must supply a qualified policy debate judge for eight rounds. (A school qualifying <u>two</u> teams must bring <u>two</u> judges).

The declining number of judges willing to judge policy debate have made prelim scheduling close to impossible. At the Gateway Nationals, even using 2 judges per prelim round, only the large number of local debate judges (about 50) made it possible to run the prelim debates. The NCFL has a similar requirement at the NCFL Grand Tournament.

*School of Excellence awards will be given on a one year trial basis in Speech, Debate, and All Events beginning at the Desert Sun Nationals. A school which scores 40+ points in either speech or debate or 60+ points in all events will receive a trophy.

Points are scored by counting the last <u>elimination round</u> in which a student appeared. Hence, a speech competitor eliminated in round 10 counts 10 points; a finalist, 13.

Congressional debate counts as part of debate. A complete explanation of the award formula will be in a future *Rostrum*.







OF A FIRST- YEAR COACH

In retrospect, it seemed a modest inquiry. With our eldest, Vanessa, preparing to enter Ridgefield High School, my wife, Nancy, and I attended an orientation for parents during the spring of her eighthgrade year. As people were dispersing, I collared the vice-principal/activities director and queried, "What would it take to get a speech team at the high school?" Simple enough, was the response. Find a coach (had one in mind), get a group of students interested or committed (doable), and raise all your own funds for the first two years. (GULP!)

Our pastor, Ken Henry, had egged me on..."Vanessa would be good at speech" -as a former Oregon state champion in Humorous Interp who also debated, he was a natural to coach the team. Alas, his schedule wouldn't permit the time commitment needed. My wife, who was on the Yamhill-Carlton (OR) H.S. speech team in the 70's, would be a good second choice. But with four other kids at home and Saturdays filled up with teaching at the local community college -- no dice. Third in line was me -one undergraduate class in oral interp at Washington State University more than twenty years ago was my claim to competency. The pay was, literally, non-existent (my choice), so the queue for the position was not lengthy.

The school board needed to okay the

activity for a speech team to exist. Directly in front of me on the agenda was the golf coach. The golf team members were on their second year, and yes, even sports need to be self-sufficient for that period of time. The golf team hadn't raised all the necessary funds, and the fanny-grilling that ensued was not a pretty spectacle. My goal was to get in, get approval, and get out. The school board wanted to know that there was more student commitment than just signing up on a sheet of paper in the office, so we held an organizational meeting at the community center. Students' questions were slightly unnerving: "When do we start debate?" "Will this help if I want to be on television?" "Do colleges consider speech team important when you apply?" They signed up for the events they were interested in, and of course some signed up for every event. The school board okayed us at the July meeting and we were off.

There was one tiny problem with me coaching the speech team. I am an elementary school teacher whose school day ends one hour after the high school's. And there are no speech classes at the high school. And we could practice only one night a week after school. Make that one BIG problem.

Our first practice in mid-October turned up a small but diverse group. Two girls who insisted on policy debate but refused to speak in front of the group -- no, an impromptu was not something they would like to try. One extemper who wouldn't practice her speeches aloud -- "I'm saying them in my head." A young lady who insisted on doing "The Highwayman" -- her favorite poem -- regardless of where or how it fit in (oral interp it turned out), and three young women to try duo interp. Yes, we were missing the male element on the team, and we decided we'd settle for one to start with. A local coach had a freshman boy attending RHS. One quick call later, we had us a little balance.

Ken Henry came to help most Tuesdays. If it was guilt-induced help, I didn't care since he was obviously more knowledgeable than I. Guiding students to find their own pieces was tough. For a small school, our library is reasonably well-stocked but not with what we needed. Ken dusted off an old duo interp he had used, and one of the teams recut it. Another two-some ended up with something light: the attempted rape and death threats of Extremities.

The next practices were - enlightening. "More emotion - make me believe it!" "Become the character!" "Diction, I can't understand you!" With less than two weeks until our first tournament, I was the one who couldn't sleep at night. The kids were calm and completely oblivious to what I was sure

was awfully competent coaching.

The first tournament was local, just six miles away. My wife's Italian heritage kicked in -- did we have enough food? She made popcorn balls for the entire team, with plenty for seconds and sharing. We met at the high school, I reminded them of my list of expected behaviors, and off we sped in a blue van with the orange letters "Ridgefield--Home of the Spudders." David Letterman has listed our high school mascot as one of the ten worst in the nation, but when you consider that the other choice was the "Prunes" (they were going for local agricultural products on the final ballot), a potato becomes a splendid mascot. The sounds as we approached the tournament site were the knocking knees and the chattering teeth of the six charter members of the speech team. "Can't we go home?" "We'll tell people that we went" were pleas that fell on deaf ears. A plaintive voice from the back of the van piped up, "Will there at least be some cute guys there?" If you remember the Mary Tyler Moore Show finale where they are all huddled together and move as one organism -- that was us as we entered. I'd cased the school the night before in order to give the team the appearance that I knew what was happening. We checked in, found a table for our stuff, anticipated the first rounds, and put our anti-perspirants to the ultimate test.

Our first postings were up. I made sure they were ensconced in the appropriate rooms and headed off to judge. A fledgling team, they sat in on each other's rounds and watched other events they might like to try. They survived the first round. It wasn't so bad. After the second round, they were enjoying themselves and loosening up. When the third round was finished, they there was an other tournament the next one hundred miles away -- could we go? The OI with "The Highwayman" took first. We just knew we were on a roll.

We wrangled an invitation to our second tournament, and since the school vans were already spoken for, I drove mine. We added a new member with a commentary, and three of the dualers decided to try impromptu. (Our extemper never returned, and the twosome determined to do CX debate never made a tournament). The duo doing Extremities made hidden finals and encountered their favorite judge of the season. He laughed during their introduction and through much of their piece (perhaps the

intro should have been darker), and is still mentioned in reverent tones. (He was so awesome"). Impromptu was a surprise. One of the girls took first in all three rounds, including hidden finals. Two speakers earned their NFL memberships at this tournament. (The memberships and advanced degrees were a huge motivating factor for this team. After each tournament they would total their new points, figure out their current NFL status and ask, "Mr. Bisbee, did we get you your membership yet?") On the way home while they were munching popcorn balls, now a tradition, they demanded ballots. I explained that I couldn't turn the overhead light on while driving and didn't want to stop. That was okay; they'd brought flashlights along.

One lesson I learned early in the season was to ask tournament directors for a break on the fees since we had to raise every penny. To a person, responses were that they were glad we now had a team and proceeded to waive some of the cost. The support from the seasoned pros in the Washington forensics ranks was unwavering.

Driving them to every tournament, I got to know my team even better. Maybe someday we'll need buses. I'm afraid it will take away from the group unity. The incidents that this team shares as part of its collective memory are varied. Kathryn (who hates to wear shoes) accidentally setting off the fire extinguisher inside the van with her feet as we were driving down Interstate-5 at 1:00 a.m....; Ben getting blamed for eating all the popcorn balls, even at a tournament he didn't attend; Vanessa doing an impromptu on the given topic "humility," accidentally delivering one on "humiliation," yet still placing; Becca (whose HI includes what has become the team's mantra, "It's a look") having her name misspelled three different ways in the local newspaper; Megan reading the NFL manual for fun during tournament down time and setting our goal -get a charter; Dove changing a duo into an HI in twenty minutes because her partner backed out at the last instant; Sheryl and the other girls crooning "Speech Guy" to Ben, her duo partner, at the McMinnville tournament's talent show; Sydney taking a victory lap with her OI trophy at a family gathering where many of her star-athlete, male cousins were gathered; meeting at the junction at four in the morning; the telephone book delivery fundraiser where the total raised was less than the deductible on my car insurance (the dent acquired during the fundraiser is still there).

The season progressed with great surprises and disappointments that were taken in stride. Whenever any speaker scored hardware, and it was always someone different, the standing gag was that we'd need two vans at the next tournament: one for the team and one for (insert the Spudder's name) ego.

The NFL qualifier in Auburn was our Olympics. The glory came from just taking part. The results were about what I expected - two downs and out. During this contest it became clear, from this coach's point of view, that the season was a success. I'd heard experienced speakers try to diminish other competitors or their work. My kids came back from rounds excited. "You have got to come hear the HIs (or duos). They're really terrific!" I was never more proud of my team than at that moment.

The Ridgefield Boosters Club was generous with us. Another coach said their boosters wouldn't give them a dime. Two of the team members made a presentation, gave examples of their speeches, and asked the boosters for funding. The girls were confident, poised, and well-spoken. Their abilities so impressed several of the businessmen attending that they received job offers. The boosters thought what we'd asked for wasn't enough and offered us more. (Of course we took it!)

The presentation for the school board garnered rave respeaking ability when they strutated their stuff at one of the meetings. Team members doing an impromptu for the local ITC provided some outside funding. The Ridgefield Lions Club funded and prepared a pancake breakfast where the team served. They let us keep every cent. People attending got value for their money - pancakes, sausages, and speeches.

Norm, Leslie, and Brad, other coaches in Clark County, were incredibly supportive. They coached me, allowed complete access to their knowledge and experience, and helped with positive strokes whenever it was obviously needed.

Our first season is history. The school letters, NFL letters and NFL pins are proudly displayed on lettermen's jackets. Seven of the eight team members say they'll be back next year (one was a senior). They have moved on to other activities or sports but are looking for interp selections for next year. Would I do it again? Without a second thought, yes!

Debating With a Weaker Partner Debating With a Weaker Partner

Almost every team debater in America has entertained the fantasy that their "weaker" partner will wake up some morning with a new brain, more tournament experience, or a new personality, even if the strain of competition has created exaggerated impressions of weakness, and the fantasy is lodged in the mind of the student actually less experienced. Nonetheless, real mismatches occur, if only because no more experienced colleagues are available, and that situation can be as frustrating as any in debate. And mismatch partnerships can be a struggle for coaches who want students to learn how to succeed as a team, even as they tire of seemingly constant complaining.

Policy debate is a team event, and everyone in a team relationship has to make compromises, to learn how to empower others. But when egos are on the line, and understandable insecurities are in full flower, stronger partners trying simply to "help out" can end up looking pompous and condescending. And coaches willing to mediate such relationship struggles can end up reinforcing insecurities when they divide labor between debaters to minimize competitive losses.

of course no team is perfectly matched, for every student brings a different combination of skill, experience, and intellect to a partnership. The problem is thus universal to an activity that hitches students together. And yet, the more I've navigated this difficult problem with my own teams, both at home and in summer settings, the more I realize how much the "weaker partner" syndrome simply reflects the need to instill in students the values at the heart of all good teaching.

Are you struggling to manage your partnership under circumstances of real imbalance? Consider the following:

1. You once walked in your partner's shoes, and not very long ago.

All of us have a tendency to forget how far we've come, and how foolish we were when we first made the awkward transition to successful regional or national debating. When short memories combine with the ticking time clocks of an ever-shortening high school career, pressure can build to win all the time. Those pressures often come at the expense of a good working relationship.

Keep in mind your own insecurities, and how small you felt when you didn't do things the right way. Even more, try and recall advice you heard that made a crucial difference in your debate education, advice that helped you "catch on." Find ways to convey such advice in a supportive way.

2. The aftermath of an embarrassing screw-up is not usually a "teachable moment."

The temptation can be overwhelming to jump on your colleague right after he or she has fumbled a topicality argument, dropped something else critical, or contradicted you in a round-losing way. After all, what better time to "reinforce" the message than right after the judge has made the same point? (As in: "YOU IDIOT! We'd be in semi's now if you hadn't dropped the turn!").

Defeat is an important teacher, but lessons are hard to learn in the immediate aftermath of loss. Your partner probably knows exactly how the key argument was mishandled, and doesn't need to hear it from you following a judge's critique. Or s/he may simply need time to come to terms with the lesson they've already heard. Instead of launching into criticism right after the debate, or even on the way home, work out an arrangement to talk later, when competitive passions and disappointments have cooled, and when comments will be received more constructively. I made a deal with my high school partner where she agreed not to discuss my shortcomings until the middle of the week after the tournament ended, and vice versa. We also agreed not to broadcast the shortcomings we perceived in each other up and down tournament hallways to anyone else who would listen; it finally sunk in that we both looked foolish marching around, broadcasting each other's failings.

I'm not advocating pathological cheerfulness either, since that can be even

more patronizing ("Great rebuttal! Now, when we get home we'll work on how to fill more than 10 seconds of your speech time! I said LOOK AT ME! How any fingers am I holding up?"). There's nothing wrong with candor or the expression of disappointment. The problem comes when bitterness, arrogance, and hostility creep in. Nothing can poison a productive relationship more quickly.

3. Sometimes you may not be the right messenger.

Your partner sees your warts and all, every bit as closely as you see his or her shortcomings. Better perhaps than anyone else, because they see you under conditions of maximum stress, partners grasp your weaknesses. This means you may not be the voice most likely to get through when a problem needs to be addressed. Let your coach play the role of intermediary. Let her make suggestions that might be misunderstood if made by you. For example, you should only rarely suggest switching speaker positions, especially when the change moves you into one of the more visible "2's." Talk to the coach first, and then the partner. Some issues do need to be directly discussed, just not all of them.

4. Stop trying to program your partner.

Program. It's an ugly word, but apt given some situations I see even at major tournaments where one partner literally dictates a colleague's speech during prep time. It never works; the prep time disappears, making you look foolish later during your impromptu rebuttal, the speech you envisioned never sounds as good when delivered out of someone else's mouth (after all, your partner is not uttering his or her own thoughts), and it's a situation ripe for conflict. What sentient being wouldn't object to being programmed like a machine, or, in the insulting jargon of contest debate, performing as your "tool"?

You may be in programming denial. That is, you've gotten more subtle than dictating speeches. You may have moved on to strategies like "sharing" flowsheets (trans: "only my brilliant thinking is worthy enough to serve as the script for this forensic encounter"), "prompting" your colleague repeatedly during speech time (trans: "I said, GET TO THE TURN, MORON!"), or "stepping in" to facilitate "productive cross-examination exchanges" (trans: "What my partner MEANT to say was actually the OPPOSITE...'). Judges rarely intervene to prevent such behaviors, and

sometimes their silence ends up encouraging destructive patterns.

Stop scripting rebuttals. Partners need to answer their own cross-ex questions. And most of all, they need to write out their own extensions. They will not be great at first. But less experienced colleagues will only get better as they start thinking for themselves under the pressure of competitive situations and the stress of time limitation. Yes, hold truly necessary conversations during prep time. But rather than dictating entire speeches, limit talk to those two or three most vital issues on which the whole round may depend.

"But," you may be sputtering, "we'll always lose! My partner can't _______[flow, think, defend my brilliance - you fill in the blank]"! Well, then.......

5. Find more subtle ways to get the job done.

Negotiate unobtrusive ways to prompt your partner, tactics not demeaning to him/her. Instead of converting your arm into a windmill ("Move on! Move on!"), devise ways to communicate your panic less visibly - lightly tapping the table or your colleague's leg. Agree to intervene only once, twice at the most (every time you interrupt your partner they lose 15 seconds of coherent speech time). If your colleague isn't able to explain a particular disadvantage turnaround, talk it through at home. Arrange rebuttal reworks that focus on troublesome or confusing arguments.

If your partner struggles to flow the negative block, find ways to relieve the stressful pressure. Here's an important tip I think just about every 1AR should follow, regardless of your experience: As you hear the 2AC deliver answers, circle the four or five best arguments on each position, the ones you know from experience your partner will most rely on in her rebuttal. Then, as the second negative responds, listen especially carefully to his answers on this circled arguments. Work to get a very good flow there, even if you've been mistakenly persuaded not to flow anything else in the negative block as you write out 1AR responses. The benefits? Your prep time will be focused on the most important answers, and if your time allocation ends up distorted, your eyes will jump right down to the most important answers.

If the experience shortcomings are less technical and more substantive, divide the argumentative labor in ways that minimize the adverse consequences. Under most (Cheshier to page 37)

So call the NFL today and ask for your modem disk so that you be connected to NFL



Book Review

HOW TO WRITE THE PERFECT BALLOT: A HANDBOOK FOR JUDGING HIGH SCHOOL SPEECH AND DEBATE TOURNAMENTS

by Genelle Austin-Lett (Kendall/Hunt 1998)

How to Write the Perfect Ballot, by Genelle Austin-Lett, Director Forensics at San Jose State University and host of the 1992 California High School State Tournament, is a valuable resource for forensics judges.

The book includes one chapter providing an overview of the judge's responsibilities, followed by chapters on judging oral interpretation, platform speeches (including spontaneous events, prepared speeches, and student congress) and debate (team and Lincoln-Douglas).

The chapters include a description of each forensics event, along with questions the judge should ask himself or herself while judging the event. These questions focus on standards that most forensics educators would agree on, such as whether an interpretation conveyed the proper mood or emotion and whether speakers and debaters provided sufficient evidence to support their claims. As the title suggests, ballot writing is a major emphasis of the book, and here the author does not disappoint. Each chapter includes sample ballots for dif-

ferent events, with comments. Even more helpful is an appendix, providing two ballots for the same speech. One ballot provides examples of effective comments and the other contains less useful feedback.

How to Write the Perfect Ballot is a "must read" book for any forensics teacher who is new to the activity, for volunteers who judge at tournaments regularly, and for more experienced judges who are new to a particular forensic event. New judges who are volunteering at a single tournament will not have time to read and process the entire book before their first round. However, they would benefit from the Chapter One overview of the judging process and the book's description of the event they are about to judge.

Professor Austin-Lett has done an excellent job of condensing the essential inform: on a forensics judge needs into a manageable size for the reader (86 pages). If judges follow the advice in her book, coaches and competitors will receive ballots that reflect fair decisions and offer encouraging comments as well as useful suggestions for improvement.

circumstances topicality and critique arguments cannot be turned by the affirmative. So think about working with your partner from the start to make her a specialist on those, or on impact-reducing case positions also unlikely to be turned (such as harm takeouts and solvency responses). The more expert the first negative is at extending topicality, the less likely he is to mishandle it in the 1AR.

6. The greater the experience gap between partners, the more necessary it is to work together at home.

This advice can be hard to handle, since the temptation is to go off and do your own work, leaving "drooler" behind. But interaction is the most important source of experience, and over time it benefits you both.

When I say "work," I'm not referring

to a setup where and mark articles and your partner becomes your processing "slave." One squad I know started calling a debater named Ed "Edward Scissorhands," after the popular film, since all they would let Ed do was cut and tape cards and cites together. Should anyone be surprised when such an

arrangement produces tension? Work to-

gether in every respect: Find materials to-

gether, card together, talk everything

through, brief together, write extension briefs

together. Do this on every argument you run, even the ones on which only you plan to specialize, since (at a minimum) real teamwork inoculates you against the understandable concern that you're trying to take everything over.

One of the greatest benefits of team debate is how it teaches us to work productively with other people, no matter how different their experience or perspective. Finding ways to make your interaction more substantive and sustained will make you both better persons, prepare you for a lifetime of teamwork, and help you finally to appreciate the real contributions any dedicated colleague can make.




