





DUO INTERP NAMED TO HONOR SANDRA SILVERS

A true renaissance woman, the late Sandra Silvers could deftly move between the intellectual caldron of coaching a top policy debate team to the finely nuanced direction of a state champion play cast while also teaching class and counseling students at Calhoun (GA) HS, and conducting the Georgia NFL district. Away from school she enjoyed playing her elegant white grand plano and leading the active social life of a southern lady in a small town.

Sandra's remarkable resume' is far too long for this page or indeed this entire issue of the Rostrum: Doyenne of the Barkley Form Key Coaches, recipient of the Barkley Forum 25th Anniversary Award for the outstanding performance of her teams at the Emory Tournament, winner of the Ralph E. Carey Trophy for "distinguished career service" as the founder and only district chair the Georgia district ever had, honored by the first Glenn Pelham Commendation for "devotion to the forensic art which teaches motivation, character and integrity", awarded the District Chair Gold Award and two NFL diamonds, coaeh of three Barkley Forum ehampion teams, several state champion debate and speech teams and record holder for the number of state honored plays.

Sandra's NFL records include winning the District Plaque twice, the District Trophy twice, a Leading Chapter Award, and coaching 3 district point leading students, and over 30 national qualifiers.

Always creative, one of Sandra's best plays featured twin girls (one as the mother, one as the daughter) in "The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man In the Moon Marigolds". Sandra believed that "in any set of twins, one is dominant". Using this feature for dramatic tension, Sandra produced a smashing play.

"Every coach in Georgia loved her", said her longtime friend and Thespian National President, P. Eric Brannen, "She helped everyone".

To celebrate Sandra's great works and great spirit, the Executive Council unanimously voted to name the new National Duo Interp category the Sandra Silvers Memorial Duo Interpretation Championship.

Sandra's daughter, Martha McClure, was kind enough to supply the cover picture of Sandra. "This is my favorite picture of mother. I think one look and you see the strong and determined lady she was", wrote Mrs. McClure. "The students she taught will forever think of her, and everything she was to debate and plays will forever be remembered."

A TRIBUTE TO LANNY

The honors and awards bestowed upon him in his career were tremendous. Emory University elected him to be one of the Key Coaches of the Barkley Forum for High Schools. This society normally honors excellence in coaching debate, so to be an I.E. coach honored by this group is a true tribute to his success. In fact, the NFL named him national coach of the year four times after he lead two different schools to national sweepstakes championships in the late 1970's and early 1980's. These organizations honored his ability as a coach. On February 22, 1998, I lost a colleague.

The Texas Forensic Association established an award in his honor about four years ago. They present this award annually to the school that qualified the most students to the state tournament. Additionally, he served as president of TFA as well as the Texas Speech Communication Association in the 1980's. His most significant accomplishment in the area of speech education is that he led the fight to make speech a graduation requirement for all public high school students in Texas. He testified before the Texas Education Agency; he brought business and civic leaders who could also testify to the value of a formal training in speech. For the past two years, Texas students have benefited from being able to take speech, debate, or oral interp to satisfy this new requirement. The formal forensics organizations in Texas honored his ability as a leader. On February 22, 1998, I lost a role model.

Few colleagues have shaped my career as much as he has. I met him for the first time at the Fargo Nationals in 1992. Two weeks later, I was in San Antonio, interviewing for a position at Clark High School, which I ultimately accepted and had the chance to teach and coach there for four years. He served as Director of Fine Arts for the North East Independent School District, where he was responsible for competitive speech and debate programs at five large high schools. My school was not one of them, yet I received support from him as if I were his employee. I first realized this at my first NFL District tournament as a coach in April, 1993. One of my policy debate teams had just won the first round and qualified for nationals. In that final round, we defeated his school - the one he once directed and put on the national forensic map. What I discovered is that he was just as proud of what my students accomplished as he would have been if they were his own. What I discovered is that when he puts his arm around me or hugged my students in congratulations, that my life would become permanently altered. On February 22, 1998, I lost a motivator.

For the next three years, I tapped into his energy, took advantage of his experience and wisdom, and was grateful for his support. I had the courage to pursue coaching and directing my own forensics program because of the confidence he displayed in me. As District Chair or Regional coordinator, he gave me responsibilities that I did not think I would ever be given. When he learned that I was looking for new job opportunities, he wrote letters of recommendations, talked to prospective employers, and simply encouraged me to follow my vision. I believe that I will know how successful of a teacher or coach I may be only if my students return to me years after they have left my classroom to share with me what they have made of their lives. Any success that my students gain at a tournament or on a test is not evidence of good teaching or coaching, for they are only short-term measurements. The long-term effect is what will count, so I may never know the results. Therefore, any long-term success I have as a teacher or as a coach can be attributed to one of my great mentors. I was twenty-one when I started taking his class and was twenty-five when I left. On February 22, 1998, I lost a great teacher.

My first image is the most powerful and frightening. I knew when I left San Antonio two years ago that I would dearly miss him. I looked forward to the times at which our tournament paths would cross - In Texas, Illinois, Georgia, and others. Last April when he asked me to be in the debate tab room at NFL Nationals, I was honored not because of any inherent honor that may come with being in the tab room, but with the opportunity to spend time with him, talk with him, laugh with him, and feed off his energy and enthusiasm once again. However, I never had that chance. About a month before nationals, he fell victim to a massive brain hemorrhage and subsequent stroke.

He spent the next six to eight weeks in intensive care. Last August, I went back to San Antonio for a speech and debate workshop and was determined to see him again. I went to the rehab center not knowing exactly what to expect. I once admired a tall. energetic man with a constant smile. What I saw, though, was a man who had to be pushed in a wheelchair by an orderly or his wife. What I saw, though, was a man who would not have remembered who I was if it were not for some coaching from his wife. If I had known that my emotionally-draining sixty minute visit would have been my last opportunity to see him, I might still be there. His recovery over the year was progressing wonderfully. Just one week before he died, he was walking on his own with help of parallel bars or in the less stressful medium of a swimming pool. His speech was becoming more fluent and his smile was returning. On February 22, 1998, I lost a model of determination.

This speech so far begs the following question: Why do I take your time this evening when you are eager to find out the results to tell you about a man that few of you, if any, have ever met. The answer is on your NFL membership cards and certificates if you were inducted either last school year or this. The final title that he was given was that of President of the National Forensic League. His signature appears on your cards if inducted in the NFL in the past two years. What I promise you is that despite its impersonal appearance, despite the obvious copy, he was just as proud when he signed the first blank certificate to be reproduced hundreds of times as he was when he signed the membership cards or certificates for his own students at Jefferson, Roosevelt, and Churchill High Schools. What he loved are those who practice the art of verbal communication - whether they are in the form of theatrical interpretations, public speaking, or academic debating. He loved it every time you practiced that piece one more time or went to the library one more time - he loved it when you performed or spoke to the best of your ability. Whether or not you are one who will be honored tonight, whether or not you will have the chance to represent Louisiana at NFL Nationals this year or ever, he loved what you (Malis to page 14)

THE SOCIALIZATION BENEFITS OF FORENSICS

There are few who dispute the claim that students tend to do better in their classroom work if they participate in speech or debate activities. When looking at outcomes represented by the acquisition of enhanced research, writing, presentation, listening, and evaluation skills, most students meet or exceed the expectations of their classroom teachers. When exploring the social side of competitive forensics, there are additional benefits for students who get involved at the middle or junior high level. While there may be more than the four I list here. I contend that the social benefits derived from include: improved attention to personal appearance and hygiene, the empowerment of students to speak out, improved behavior as an observer, and enhanced respect and collegiality toward adults. These benefits are the focus of this essay.

Appearance

Most middle and junior high students are concerned about how they look. Their bodies and voices are changing and many are self-conscious about what others think of these changes. In the school setting, they are exposed to their classmates every day. Unfortunately, as far as socialization goes, many times students are stereotyped or categorized by their tastes, activities, and behavior. Once they have been so placed by their classmates, it is difficult for them to reverse the placement and they may experience frustration or alienation. One of the benefits of interscholastic forensics for these students is the ability to "restart" their socialization within a group of students who have similar interests. At a speech tournament, students are encouraged to dress in a way that is more formal than their normal school attire. Most coaches are aware of the research that suggests that when students place more attention to how they appear to the critics, their scores tend to be better and they place higher in the competition. In addition, in the more formal forensic environment, it is easier for an adult to encourage students to keep their hair away from their expressive eye brows or to avoid wearing jewelry that might become a distraction from what they are trying to say. As the students begin to pay attention to what they wear and how they look at tournaments, they come to realize it may also make a difference in their classrooms. Because their classmates are not aware of what has transpired at the tournament, middle and junior high forensic students may be able to make changes in their own appearance that enhances how they think of themselves and the way they interact with others.

Empowerment

In many classrooms, communication activities are fairly informal. Students are encouraged to speak clearly and avoid losing their focus in the face of possible distractions. However, the fact that classmates know each other quite well makes it difficult for a student to take on a persona or speak with authority. Without a skilled teacher to control the interaction, the shy students simply fall back to the stereotypes that have been imposed on them and choose not to confront the assessments of their classmates. In competitive forensics, students rarely compete against a student from their own schools. As a result, when they are in a round of competition, they can be whomever they want to be. This freedom to speak, without fear of interruption or negative judgment from peers, becomes an empowering dimension for their socialization. Students who would otherwise be shy find their voice through competition. In turn, the skills they acquire through competition can enhance their presentations in class and help them to build their self-confidence to the point where they can confront the stereotypes or hold their classmates may have on them.

Observation

Learning to be a good observer at forensic tournaments is another socializing benefit for some younger students. Our society is very visually-oriented. Young people watch the television more than ever before. Through cable access in their homes, students can go to the movies, opera, symphony, super bowls, athletic events, and concerts. One effect of this access is a less-attentive, less-formal climate for observation behavior. A student can eat, sleep, talk, read, or play games while watching something on television. Without an environment where students must be active participants as a listener, they never learn to focus on the spoken word. Forensics provides such a focusing environment. This was brought close to home when one of my younger students, unbeknownst to me, stopped by the snack bar on his way to a round to observe a teammate. Once in the room, he proceeded to open his soda can and tear into a candy bar. Fortunately, the critic in the room instructed him to refrain while students were speaking. It didn't take long for his more experienced teammates to explain why this behavior was distracting and he learned not demonstrate obscrver behavior that was more appropriate to an athletic event.

Respect

Finally, students learn respect for adults through forensics. Initially, younger students don't really know how to communicate with adults who serve as critics. These students often disclose far too much information or remain self-conscious around judges or coaches from other schools. As time passes, and these students become more aware that coaches from other schools are often judges, they associate these coaches with the students they are meeting from the other schools. As students talk about their coaches, their new friends learn to be more comfortable and communicate on a level that is respectful and courteous. Another dimension of this respect comes from the ballots written by the adults who serve as judges. If the comments written by the critics are positive, students learn that their personal efforts are acknowledged and rewarded. If the critics provide suggestions for improvement, the students learn that they are worth helping. The respect that comes from this interaction enhances the student's self-esteem.

The socialization of students is an important dimension of development that results through participation in interscholastic forensic competition. While the classroom environment is an excellent place to introduce students to the importance of communication in our world, the tournament setting can provide benefits ranging from increased attention to appearance and hygiene to respect for adults. As the NJFL moves forward with its programs for middle and junior high school students, it will be useful to consider the wide range of benefits to be gained by the young people who are allowed to participate.



PUTTING SPEECH IN MIDDLE SCHOOL -WITHOUT AN ARGUMENT

In February, I watched a couple of our seventh graders talk before a public Board of Education meeting. Before an audience of more than two hundred they spoke with great feeling and animation about how their class had developed a relationship with the residents of a nearby nursing home. Speaking in an extemporaneous style, with one note card apiece, they were sensational! But in our town, they are certainly not unique.

I have taught a speech course to every Scarsdale Middle School student for fifteen years now, to favorable reviews. I've spoken at conferences, and written about it in these pages and elsewhere. Still, our program is unique. I know of no other middle school where speech is taught as a separate required course for all students. This issue of *Rostrum*, dedicated to Middle Schools, is a great forum to spell out what I think *every* middle school ought to be doing.

First of all, unequivocally, a course in public speaking is appropriate for the middle school. To those who question it for this "vulnerable" age, I have always said, "precisely because of the age." Well taught, this course builds self-confidence and a positive self-image. In the proper atmosphere, students are highly supportive of one another. At no other age are students so ready to leap into projects and untraditional assignments, whether or not these involve oral presentation. Why not build, at this early age, a foundation in a skill the student will use throughout academic and later life?

For All Students

In this journal I need make no brief for the importance of public speaking as a required skill for success in life. Yet I am equally sure that many readers work in programs where speech and debate involve an elite upper level of students. I am passionate about bringing my program to every child in the school. Why should this fundamental skill be restricted to any level of the student body? There would be as much logic in offering physical education classes only to students who read above grade level. Speech is a universal skill. We are not training solely the future lawyers or legislators, but the entire population. The Middle School philosophy embraces this approach. Middle school is where most classes are heterogeneous; where "tracking" is generally anathema. This is where educators still believe in the development of the whole child.

Speech, Not Debate

If you are absolutely wedded to the concept of bringing forensics to the middle school, you might want to stop reading right here. I am talking here about kids learning to get up and talk to a group, simply that. I will leave debate to the high school. There is much to learn about speaking first. Deal with the basic skills of poised, energetic, extemporaneous style presentation in front of an audience. Don't confuse the issue. What every member of society needs is the ability to make sense, and a good impression, on his or her feet. The attempt to produce "debate" in the middle school classroom generally subordinates the oral skills to the academic content, or totally disregards speech technique in an effort to teach the subject matter. The result is the neglect or worse, the denigration of the skill. Teach the art of speaking, and let the subject matter be secondary. In my assignments, students have topics, but they have great latitude in the choice.

The greatest challenge is to get students of this age out of the habit of reading and reciting. For up until now they have probably been praised for doing precisely the wrong thing. They have read other people's words aloud. They have shared their own writing aloud. They have pretended to speak, in reality reciting in singsong inflections a rote script playing in some dim and distant corner of the brain. Get them to engage the brain in real live speaking. This won't be done by asking them to discourse on academic topics or abstruse issues. Let them talk about how they hate Sunday school, or their aunt's smoking. Have them sell an old shoe, or talk about winning a soccer trophy.

Speech in the middle school can include many of the standard forms of speech, such as personal experience, demonstration, information. A course should also draw liherally on theater games, improvisation, and impromptu speaking. Students of this age will dive into all of these with glee because these activities are fun. My ehallenge, I have always said, is to take an activity which most adults dread more than death or the

dentist, and make my classroom a place that kids love to enter. A dry textbook approach to classic speech would be doomed at this level.

A Stand-Alone Program

At Scarsdale Middle School, every student takes speech for three weeks in sixth, seventh, and eighth grades. They come to my classroom, a unique place. This separate unit stands apart as a course. During those three weeks the English teacher works on an interdisciplinary unit with a team member. These projects are a bonus spin-off of the speech program. Clearly then, our district has made the commitment of devoting a teaching position to Public Speaking at the middle school level. So while I am part of the English department, Public Speaking, in the minds of faculty and students, has an identity and integrity it would lack if it were merely a unit of work, such as "spelling" or "the short story." Skill and achievement in speech is recognized and given credibility in students' minds. They value the skill; they strive for excellence; they appreciate the recognition for their achievements.

In Your Middle School

Can you establish this course in your middle school? That all depends. You will have to convince the administration and the community of its validity and value. Is that possible? It is fairly easy to make the case for the prevalence of oral communication in our society, even that your students will speak more than write in the future. You may find an administration or school board reluctant to establish an independent program. Interestingly though, I find most people's reaction, once they see it, to be some variation of, "I wish I'd had this course at that age!" Argue for its existence on its own, and not subsumed in English or Social Studies elasses. Argue for the recognition of this skill as a skill.

Course Guidelines

l would hope to persuade the reader to establish this course in a middle school. The regular readers of this magazine may not be in a position to do that. This issue is read in middle schools, so perhaps there is a chance.

Are you, or do you have someone with the background, the interest, the skill in speaking? A love for kids at this age? A

readiness to have a good time with them?

Establish from the outset that this is a non-competitive class. Set aside all thoughts of contests, matches, ratings, points. You can find times during the year to have special events like a speech contest, but make your classroom a place where the goal is to have everyone win. Make the class, as audience, the primary support group. Young speakers may feel that they are in mortal peril up there, like high wire aerialists. The audience needs not only to be the listeners, but also the coaches; not only the cheerleaders, but also the safety net.

Do you have to give grades? If not, don't. I make a compromise. I am asked by my department to give a grade for each student at the end of their three weeks. I don't put a grade on individual speeches. I write fairly extensive evaluations, using an assessment rubric. In addition, seventh and eighth graders are responsible for writing self-evaluations, using the same rubric. This is accomplished by having them take speeches home on videotape for review. The emphasis is on positive self-evaluation. At the bottom of the page, after the rubric, is a space. "Comment on one or two things you did well." One of the signs on the wall of my room says, "Whether you think you can or you think you can't, you're probably right." I am absolutely convinced, from my experience, that most students, given the right feedback, experience a gain in selfconfidence in this activity.

Make It Fun

At this age, at any age(?), fun is an important component. I will start off on the first day with any group by playing a game. It might be just a "name game," or a "story line," each player adding a word to compose a story as quickly as possible. Or it might be a full-period game of "To Tell the Truth," letting the audience guess which of four storytellers is really talking about a real-life experience.

The "Pet Peeve" speech is a great one for beginners. They can't help but have a good time with it. The ordinary sales speech becomes a game when the speaker must "sell" an item of no value! And the normally serious persuasive speech can be fun when the impromptu situations become the proverbial "refrigerators to Eskimos" pitch.

At every turn, there is a way to inject a little levity. A practice session becomes "The Olympics," with "judges" holding up numbers. Even determining the speaking order can be fun. Shuffle the cards and cut the deck.

Make Room for Success

Don't overemphasize writing and written organization. Require something, to be sure. I don't let kids get up without handing me an "outline." But I'm fairly flexible about what it looks like. I want to see that some planning has gone into it. One of the beauties of this class is that while you'll certainly get great success out of those top all-around students who also write well, you'll also get wonderful work from those who don't, if you allow it. Remember that this is a skill which just might have more in common with baseball or ballet than it does with books. Another sign on my wall, its source lost, reminds, "When you speak, the audience gets 7% from your words, 38% from your tone of voice, and 55% from your body language." Let the topics, and most of the speeches, be from outside academia. Two of my seventh graders, only recently mainstreamed and far from academic stars, recently captivated their classes with demonstration speeches, one on karate moves, the other on how to solder a wire.

Get the Whole School on Board

Talk to your colleagues. Get them to buy into the basics of public speaking. If the kids go to their next period and give an oral report by burying their heads in scripts, you might as well give up! It may take inviting colleagues in to see your classes, or sharing your materials, or evaluation sheets, but get them on board.

Find ways to give students real speaking opportunities. If there's a concert, let students comment on the music. If there's a guest speaker, let a student do the introduction. And certainly, when there's a report to the Board of Education, let the kids do the talking!

Can Every Student Really Do This?

Well, almost. I teach 900 students each year, and I do find two or three for whom I'll make a special arrangement. Getting the number that low, by the way, is partly a function of some of the strategies mentioned above: the non-graded approach, the non-academic emphasis, the games. And a few of those who do make it to the podium do so after an intermediate step, speaking just for the camera, for example, and watching a replay with positive feedback. The "Introduce Your Partner" speech works to break down fear and reluctance. The student is introducing a classmate as if that person is "today's guest speaker." "You're doing it for her! This is not about you," I tell them. And even the most hesitant can get up there.

Public Speaking is inherently a pressure situation. Do you want to increase that tension in the classroom, or minimize it? I do both. Sure, my room is set up in an arena format, a raised platform and optional lectern for the speaker. Added lights and hanging mikes serve functional and symbolic purposes. Pressure! But, many subtleties serve to break down that tension, not the least of which is the "on deck" seat next to me. Ostensibly, it's to hand in the outline and check the note card. In fact, it's the opportunity for one more encouraging pep talk, or a little hand-holding, usually figurative, occasionally literal! In the rare case, it's the time to intercept the student who isn't going to succeed at the lectern, avoid the disaster, and look for another strategy.

This Won't Be Easy

Trying to set this up in your school won't be easy. Most people won't be ready for it. For openers, you will be bucking two current trends. First, your students won't be writing. But they will be learning to interact in the medium through which they will communicate most throughout life. Second, they won't be using computers. (Good Grief!) But they will be learning to "interface" with a far more complex audience: other human minds.

On what stone tablets is it written, after all, that all human knowledge, at least for the 11 to 14-year-old, is contained in the four major academic disciplines? If you have a real middle school, ready for team planning, interdisciplinary teaching, innovation and experimentation, you can do it. The only question is whether the adults are ready for this. Your students will love it.





FORENSIC MENTORING IN A RURAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Richland #44 is a consolidated school district. The high school and the elementary school are in separate communities seven miles apart. There is constant concern that the transition from sixth grade in the elementary school to the seventh grade in the high school is too foreign and traumatic for the students. Our administrators are always looking for ways to make that move easier for students. Consequently, when the speech department suggested that a speech season for sixth graders be established and that the high school speech team be the sixth grade coaches, the administration saw and opportunity to help students become familiar with the environment they would be coming to in a year. The reason that the speech department had suggested this activity was that it seemed like a good idea to begin earlier to build a program. Seventh and eighth graders had been able to compete with the upperclassmen. However, few of them ever sought that opportunity. It seemed as though it took a couple of years for a student to decide what forensics was and whether he/she would like to try it. Thus, the plans were laid. I was the only forensics coach in the system; there was no possible way that I could add to my existing load. I talked to the veteran speech students and proposed that they coach the sixth graders who would be interested in speech. The older students loved the idea.

The process we began then is basically the same as we use today. In January, I go to the elementary school, armed with a letter to the parents, to talk to the sixth graders about being in speech. One or two seniors go with me. We explain what speech is and what a commitment on their part would involve. They are each given the letter to take home to their parents. On the bottom of the letter is a perforated detachment, which they are to return, signed by a parent, if the student wants to participate. Twice each week, each student rides the shuttle bus to the high school to practice. Students are met at the door by a high school speech team member who will help coach the practice session for that date. Most senior high speech team members work one night a week from 3:30-5:00 p.m. Hence, each sixth grader is being coached by two different senior high students, with whom s/he becomes better acquainted. At the first practice session, all of the sixth graders, junior high speech team members, and senior high speech team members meet together. We call this meeting our "work night." The students choose categories and selections. The sixth graders watch the older students practice their speeches, and the older students help the younger ones make choices as to what category they will compete in and either help them start writing or help them choose selections for interp. The night culminates in pizza and a little socializing. It is a good way to get the sixth through eight graders comfortable with the older kids.

After practicing and preparing for

competition, the day finally arrives when the first junior high tournament is held. The "coaches" are enlisted to go to the tournament as judges. They are then present to help junior highers read schedules, find rooms, and calm nerves. Both groups look forward to this day for which they have been preparing for nearly six weeks. We compete at five designated junior high meets; then the junior high season is over. Seventh and eighth graders may continue to compete with the senior high team.

The benefits of this mentoring program have been multiple. The administration has achieved for several students the goal of smoothing the transition from elementary to secondary levels. The sixth graders come to seventh grade already familiar with the building, with the upperclassmen and with some of the teachers. The speech department has accomplished what it wanted also. The students are learning the basic skills earlier so that in senior high, they can concentrate on nuances. The size of the program at Richland has more than doubled, and this year; the school board hired an assistant coach. These benefits were all anticipated. The finest benefits are those that were not necessarily anticipated. For example, the senior high students have been able to hone their skills because by watching and teaching the younger ones, each student more clearly identifies where s/he is weak and what her/his strengths are. The younger students emulate the senior highers. They are more willing to change and work at skills that senior high school students point out to them. The bond between older and younger become so strong that team cohesiveness develops. The school has boasted an NFL chapter since 1991. Many senior high students get involved in the mentoring program for the judging points, but they stay with the program for the personal gain. The younger students are motivated to become NJFL members in order to emulate their eoaches. This past year, we added 26 new members and degrees to our NFL chapter, and 28 new members and degrees to our NJFL chapter. The mentoring has resulted in more good things than any of us had ever imagined.

MEETING MIDDLE SCHOOL PHILOSOPHY WITH A COMPETITIVE SPEECH PROGRAM

Agassiz Middle School is a sixth and seventh grade building. It is broken into teams or houses. As a building, we stress our desire to try to achieve the objectives of a middle school and try to follow middle school philosophy. Our competitive speech program meets several goals of our school.

Goals

One of the goals of our school is to have 100% of our students involved in an activity outside of the classroom. Because speech is different than athletics, our administration saw a need that we could meet through a competitive speech program.

In addition, another goal of the middle school is to work for positive self-esteem. The tournaments we attend award many ribbons or certificates, usually at least half of the contestants in each category receive awards. In addition, the tournaments we attend are usually quite generous in terms of actual trophy place awards as well. It is rare for my students to attend a tournament without most receiving something tangible to take home. We are also members of the National Junior Forensic League. This meinbership rewards students simply for being brave enough to try a speaking activity. If they attend they receive points. If they volunteer for speaking in the school or community, they receive points. If they present orally in class, they receive points. All of these points add up to increased degrees for the student. They are on the same level playing field no matter the level of the natural talent. They can see their points accumulating and they feel good about this. This meets the goal of positively building selfesteem in students.

We also meet the school and district goal for increasing communication skills. This is an important goal of our Reading and Writing Across the Curriculum committee. Our school has seen an increase in student interest in communication activities since our program was established.

Because as a program we have found ourselves rooted in the overall goals of the school, we have garnered the support of our teachers, our administration, and our district to establish and maintain a speech program separate from the levels above us. We have come to be known as an individual program in our state.

Beginnings

For most of the speech season, we exist as a separate speech team. We practice each day and work together much as a high school speech team does with a few exceptions. I begin the season with an open invitation for sixth and seventh grade students to attend a speech workshop held at North Dakota State University. The students miss a day of school to experience an explanation of speech events. 1 ask the students to commit to attending at least one tournament if they attend the NDSU workshop. They don't have to speak, but their attendance usually results in them signing up for the next tournament as a speaker! When I actually start the practice season, l

usually conduct several meetings of group instruction regarding the basics of speech. The next step is to schedule before and after school practice groups of three or four students to "try out" pieces. The students critique each other in addition to my evaluations. This helps them focus on each others' performance, and they learn a lot in the process. Finally, I move to individual 15-20 minute practice slots. They may still come and observe others, but they only are required to attend practice during their individual "lesson" time.

Tournaments

The first tournament we attend, we do not enter as competitors. I put an early tournament on the schedule so students can come to a tournament and experience it without worrying about speaking as well. When I do this I "attach" each student to a high school student who is competing. The middle school student follows the high school student's schedule to get a feel for what it is like to do speech in competition. This really cuts down on the anxiety at the first tournament in which we compete!

We register for tournaments as Agassiz Middle School. Some of the junior high and middle school programs in our state register as part of the high school teams. Others register as themselves, but are clearly a feeder program to the high school program. Still others only compete for a few weeks to give the junior high/middle school students a taste of the competitive speech world. We compete the entire season as Agassiz. Only at tournament which are limited to high school registrations do we integrate into the high school team's open slots.

Being a middle sehool teacher, I am excited about the increase in programs at this level. I think that the National Junior Forensic League has made an impact on schools in our area beginning junior high/middle school programs. The NJFL provides a method of rewarding students for hard work who might not always be the "winners." It is a great organization for middle schools and junior high schools to join.

THE J.F.K. MIDDLE SCHOOL DEBATE TEAM

Actually it all started one day in 1990 when Merle Ulery asked me if I would judge a debate tournament for him. I had never seen a round of any type of forensic competition but I told him that I would try. That Saturday I put on my best suit (my first mistake) and left my home at about 6 a.m. to drive to a school in South Miami.

"OK, what do you want me to do?" I asked Merle when I found him in the "Tab" room.

"Don't worry," he said, "You are going to judge Team debate. You'll love it". After I recovered from the shock of the first round, I can say that the next few hours changed my life. I was teaching in the "Student At Risk Program" and I used to ask, "Are these the future leaders of our country?" When I watched those young debaters I said, "These are the future leaders

of our country, and we are in very good shape."

I was hooked. The next year when our Assistant Principal, Ms. Beer, asked me if I would like to try to set up a debate program, I jumped at the chance. In order to get around the certification problem, the class was called Research and Critical Thinking. In August of 1992 the 12 students with a coach who had no idea what he was doing met in a small room to learn about Foren-

Over the last six years there have been a number of things which we can point to with pride. The program grew from those twelve students to seventy-two in three

grades. For three years we struggled to be allowed to compete with the other schools in the South Florida area, even going to the "Coach of the Year."

Novice State twice. Then in 1996 the NJFL was established giving us the chance to have two different debate programs. We received a charter membership #0035. In the same year I was honored by the Dade County Speech and Debate Association as

Everything has come together with this year's team. Twenty-two novice students have earned almost three hundred points each. Three more students have over two hundred points and five more have over a hundred. Four of our students, Faudlin Pierre in OO, Aniska Petit-Frere in OI, and two Congressional Debaters, Candice Koon-Koon and Javonne Gray, won the chance to compete in the Florida Forensic League Varsity State Tournament in Orlando. At the Charger Invitational held at North Miami Beach, thirty-seven schools were entered. In the final overall point JFK came in twelfth. There were four other middle schools entered and the closest middle school to us was thirty-second. And we are not through. We have qualified a total of seventeen students to compete in I.E. and Congressional Debate at the District NFL Championships (could St. Louis be in the

> future for a couple of our kids?) There is also Novice State in April.

In the front hall of JFK Middle School there is a trophy case filled with the awards won by this year's team. Twentytwo times a year these kids meet about 6 a.m. on Saturday morning in front of JFK, travel to another school, spend the day in competition, and get home after dark. For ninth grade students this is unusual dedica-

tion. I count myself among a very fortunate few who have had the rare privilege of working with young people of this caliber. If my debate career must come to an end this year let me say that this has been the most wonderful and rewarding six years of my teaching experience.
