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Our Lucky Seventh!

In certain speculative games, not frequently mentioned in educational journals (!), seven is considered a lucky number; and so it most certainly has proved to be in the history of NFL Speech Tournaments. Our Jacksonville tournament was our biggest and our best; considered from every angle it was the most universally successful in the history of the League.

Throughout the tournament, sportsmanship like losing and modest winning were the unbroken rules of competition. Our hosts had done everything possible to contribute to the pleasure and happiness of the meet and contests were won and lost with the same spirit of friendly rivalry. The committee on Good Will and Grievance was as unnecessary as an olive wreath at an Indian war dance.

Each tournament has taught the League management additional lessons in tournament administration and planning. The Jackson-ville tournament was no exception to the rule. From it, has been learned that "bigness" is not an insurmountable object to efficiency; the 1937 tournament was our biggest and was run the most efficiently of all. New lessons on effective housing of tournament participants were also learned from the Jacksonville tournament and will be passed on to host cities in the future.

Our 1938 tournament will also include definite and valuable educational features by nationally recognized speech leaders; it will be a combination tournament-convention and educational speech conference on high school speech problems. The Veterans' Club is planning something special for the 1938 tournament.

Due to the conflicting speech convention in Madison, Wisconsin, fewer judges from out-of-state colleges were available than ordinarily; but the judging went on with a minimum of complaint and with general satisfaction. How? NFL coaches were used more extensively than customarily. In the next tournament still more of our own coaches will be used and a procedure developed for reimbursing qualified judges from among our own ranks who are invited to serve as judges. Some coaches will be invited in as judges with expenses paid, who do not have contestants in the meet, and all District Chair-

men will be encouraged to attend the next tournament-convention-conference. All in all, our lucky seventh taught us much and was thoroughly a most enjoyable affair.

To Harold Gibson, speech director at Jacksonville, Principal James Mutch, Superintendent R. O. Stoops and all of Jacksonville go our profound thanks and admiration for giving us our most successful tournament.

Our Business Meeting

Wednesday morning's business session of the tournament brought out some interesting discusions on league development and stimulated the customary amount of impromptu oratory and individual debating.

The committee on Tournament Betterment was comprised of R. P. Hibbs, DuQuoin, Chairman, Russell Caldwell, Wooster, and Holle DeBoer, Greeley. Recommendations included a suggestion that more educational features be added to the next tournament; use of NFL judges be increased with an increased entrance fee demanded, rebates from which are to be made to coaches who judges; and that extemporaneous contests be altered to reduce further any possibility of memorized speeches. Russell Caldwell stirred up a young revolt by suggesting that the declamatory section be eliminated from future tournaments; he and E. E. The League Welfare Committee was Mary Blackburn, Granite City, chairman, Levi Osterhus, Minneapolis, and Carl Jackson, Minneapolis. Its recommendations proposed tightening the degree requirements for advanced degrees and measures to assure more prompt filing of contest reports.

The committee on constitution and by-laws was made up of J. Arthur Nelson of Omaha-Benson, chairman; H. W. Mathison of Eau Claire, and K. V. Giffen of Wadsworth. No important changes were proposed in the existing Book of Laws and Regulations.

C. E. Gady (colonel to you!) of Oklahoma City, and John Schmidt of Sioux City comprised the committee on next year's convention city. Bidders thus far for the privilege of entertaining us in 1938 include Ft. Wayne, Ind., (definite), and, tentatively, Sioux City, Iowa; Detroit, Mich., Wichita, Kans., and Omaha, Neb. California urged the group to consider convening on the west coast at least "one year in ten." The Executive Council will decide upon the tournament city at its mid-winter meeting in New York City in connection with the annual convention of the Teachers of Speech Association.

A Book No Speaker Can Afford to Miss!

Dale Carnegie's sensational best-seller, "How to Win Friends and Influence People" (Simon & Schuster, New York City, \$1,98). is a book no student of effective speaking can afford not to read.

While, not essentially a book on speech techniques, it is nevertheless a book written by a master speech teacher and it is a book which discusses valuable devices for influencing human behavior. Dale Carnegie has taught adult speech classes in New York City for years: he approaches the whole problem of speaking from the viewpoint of one who recognizes it as a device for securing support and winning sympathetic acceptance for the speaker's arguments.

Replete with interesting examples of case illustratoins of techniques which have proved effective in influencing people, this book gives the student speaker practical suggestions in the important art of winning arguments and securing conviction. As a scrap book of interesting anecdotes it is a valuable accessory to any speaker's "tool kit"; as a treatise on what not to do and what to do in influencing human behavior it is invaluable. It should have a place in every high schol library and should be supplementary reading material in every high school speech course. -Karl E. Mundt. -NFL
