

#### Famous Coaching Team Breaks Up



The verdant terraces make the approach to Beverly Hills High School one of the most beautiful in California.



With definite assurance from Ted Malone of the National Broadcasting Company that he will be able to be in Beverly Hills for our national tournament, the Poetry Reading Contest tentatively announced becomes a certainty.

Mr. Malone will again conduct the contest in his own personal style, will award a beautiful pair of book ends to the winner and place the best contestants on the NBC network program.

#### Radio Speaking, Too

The availability of excellent studio facilities in Beverly Hills and Hollywood and the widespread interest shown in this form of speaking have prompted the addition of such contest this year. Each contestant will draw two commercial announcements, have five minutes to look them over, and then read them into a microphone. Next he will draw one news flash and read it with but a minute to scan its content. The judges will hear him through an amplifier in another room.

## Both Contests Open to All

Poetry Reading and Radio Announcing contests will begin on Wednesday mornnig when well over half of the contestants have been eliminated from the regular tournament. Anyone entered in one of the regular contests may register for Poetry or Radio for an entry fee of \$2.

The Granite City, Ill., Chapter celebrating its tenth birthday is on parade. Among the charter members are Leonard Hopkins, a promising young lawyer who has been appointed assistant state's attorney; Leonard Visser, a member of the St. Louis Little Theatre; Wallace Haines, teaching speech at the Moody Institute in Chicago; a doctor, an editor, two business men and two teachers.

Granite City's National Champions are still carrying on. Harold Stark, first place winner in Oratorical Declamation and second place winner in Dramatic in 1935, is at present in New York, a member of the supporting cast for Mae West. Incidentally, he was selected from more than 400 applicants. For the past two summers Harold has been a member of the chorus of the St. Louis Municipal Opera.
