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UNITED STATES TEAM WINS WORLD

A team of high school students from across America and sponsored by the National Forensic League won the World Schools Debating Championship at the World Tournament held in New Zealand, August 10 through August 18. The five students, who had neither met nor worked with each other until the long flight from Los Angeles, defeated teams from most of the English-speaking world. After winning seven of eight preliminary rounds held in schools in and around Auckland and Wellington, the United States team defeated Wales in the quarterfinal round and Scotland in the semifinal round. The final round, held in the Beehive, the home of the New Zealand Parliament, saw the United States team defeat the team from Pakistan, 4-3. The topic debated in the final round was that *the United Nations is the one best hope for the future*. The United States team was assigned the affirmative in the final debate.

To overcome the handicap of the debaters not having worked together earlier, the team arrived in Auckland three days early to prepare its positions on those topics released in July. Since six of the eleven debates would have only sixty-to-ninety minutes of preparation between the release of the topic (and assignment of side) and the debate itself, and since no coaches could assist in those

preparations, the team had to use those early days to learn each other's particular strengths and to become an organized team instead of five individuals.

The competition was opened officially, on Wednesday, August 10, at a Maori holy place in Auckland when Her Excellency, Dame Katherine Tizzard, Governor-General of New Zealand, Queen Elizabeth's personal representative, welcomed the contestants and their adult coaches and coordinators.

The following day, two rounds of competition were held before everyone flew to Wellington where they met the families that would house them for the next week. Additional preliminary rounds were conducted on Friday, August 12; Sunday, August 14; Monday, August 15; and Tues-

day, August 16. These were held at schools within a 70 mile radius from Wellington, with enthusiastic audiences of students and adults at every venue. The Governor-General hosted a reception at Government House to welcome the participants officially to the capital city of New Zealand.

Quarterfinal and semifinal debates were held on Wednesday, August 17, and the final round, in front of an audience of many hundreds, took place on Thursday, August 18. The wooden trophies presented had been hand carved and blessed by Maori tribesmen.

HIGH SCHOOL DEBATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Deputy Prime Minister Don McKinnon greeted everyone following the final debate, and Prime Minister Jim Bulger then hosted a reception for the participants. A farewell banquet was held in Wellington's Civic Centre that evening.

Team captain and NFL Point Leader Ami Arad, from Arroyo Grande HS in California, was recognized for his individual skill in an impromptu debate competition organized by the New Zealand hosts to showcase the participants ability to use humor to good effect.

He finished second in this event. Team member Dan Krebs, of Mullen HS in Denver, Colorado, was a finalist in this event. Other team members were Mark Krumholz of Teaneck HS in New Jersey, Karuna Patel of New York's Bronx HS of Science,

and Jennifer Rotman of Taos HS in New Mexico. The coach, Cat Horner Bennett of Taos, New Mexico, was assisted by Richard Sodikow of New York who was also the delegation chief. Anne Shapiro of New York attended as a team supporter who observed rounds and scouted the opposition (an encouraged practice in international debate).

Among the topics released in advance (in addition to the one debated in the final round) were:

Feminism has corrupted the family.

One superpower is better than two.

Technology has outstripped morality.

Some of the limited preparation topics were:

Hollywood has a lot to answer for.

Tourists are a global menace.

Repression of civil rights justifies violent action.

This year's United States team received

major underwriting from the National Forensic League, the coordinating organization for competitive debate and speech for secondary schools in the United States. The United States had fielded a team in each of the previous world com-

petitions, but this was its first championship. The best previous showing by a United States Team occurred in February of 1993, at Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, when the team finished third (semifinalist). The Seventh World Schools Debate Championship will be held in February, 1995, in Cardiff, Wales.

Future proposed tournament hosts include Wales, Pakistan, Bermuda, and Israel. The National Forensic League is seeking major sponsorship to bring the World Schools Debate Tournament to the United States in 2000 or before.

WHY WE LIKE THE IMMIGRATION TOPIC

There is nothing quite as exciting, or as indescribable, as making a wager based on something that you know and know well. Debate is sort of a wager if you think about it. You bet that your arguments and positions and files are more or less superior to those of your opponent. The stakes are certainly higher than Las Vegas or Reno given that egos and reputations and TOC bids are in the balance, but this just makes the game all the more exciting.

We play a little game called "guess the topic," where we try to predict both the problem area and then the topic in succession. There is no money or anything on the line; it's just a game of chance we've learned to lose. So this year was quite a surprise when, for the first time, we successfully predicted both. Imagine what the payoff would've been if we had wagered! It's too late to worry about wagers not made, but it's not too late to tell the story of why we believe the immigration debate is argumentatively and educationally an excellent choice.

Relevance

In the first place, I think this is an extremely topical topic. Don't be confused by the semantics. What I mean to say is that this area of discussion (immigration) is particularly alive in the real political arena at this point in history. Other topics have been focused on important policy questions, but few have had as much current relevance as this topic. How will this help debate? Let's review a few critical issues which will certainly be discussed at length this year.

The immigration issue is inexorably linked to a great

many other topics of interest to debaters, including such seemingly unrelated concepts as foreign aid, unemployment, the international population crisis, ethnic conflicts and even the domestic situations in many foreign nations. It is easy to see how there is a "revolving door" that allows debaters to choose either a small domestic issue (e.g. racial conflict or unemployment) or a huge international issue (e.g. trade wars or population growth) as a case advantage. The literature is saturated with discussion of these issues and how they relate to the design and implementation of US immigration policy.

Population

Population, for example, relates to immigration in several ways. First, increases in immigration to the US obviously raise the domestic population growth rate. The real problems start when the number of people entering the US is greater than the number of people who die from any cause. Remember that most of the research in the field suggests that US population has reached zero-growth meaning there are exactly as many births as deaths. The immigrant population growth rate, however, continues to grow rapidly. The other side of the population coin, however, is that assimilation reduces the population growth rate. This means that the more "Americanized" immigrants become, the fewer children they have. There is debate here from economists, such as the University of Maryland's Julian Simon, who say that population growth in developed countries like the US is a good thing. For her part, Virginia Abernathy discusses the other link to population

growth. She thinks that many "Third World" nations use our liberal immigration policy as a safety valve for their excess populations, letting their excess or even undesirable citizens "escape" to the US so they can prop up their own standard of living. If the United States closes that option, she argues, these nations will be forced to cope with their own population crises.

Economics

Many say that immigration also affects the economic situation. From international trade to unemployment and deficit reduction, experts suggest immigration has both positive and negative effects on the economic health of the US and the world. Evidence supporting both sides of this debate is plentiful. For example, Vernon Briggs, a professor of labor relations at Cornell University, contends that immigration has profound negative effects on the unemployment rate of those in the lowest echelon of society the urban poor. He suggests that immigrants perform low-paying, low-skill occupations at rates of pay below the minimum wage for domestic workers. When immigrants serve as a cheaper source of labor, they drive down the wage rates of domestic workers, especially urban blacks, and displace many of those unwilling to work for the lower wages. George Borjas argues that, while immigrants may or may not have an effect on the economy, they do have lower incomes than their domestic counterparts. The resulting class group is one that is poor and, because they aren't US citizens, have no right to vote. Borjas says this creates a permanent underclass of "rightless" people in America. Donald

Huddle, a professor of economics at Rice University, studied immigration's effects on the economic situation of Texas, as well as California. He concludes that immigrants cost taxpayers in both states millions of dollars annually due to abuse of social services and public spending. These studies are a large part of the reason that immigrants are also blamed for the excess deficit spending in America. Many states, particularly California, Arizona, Florida, and to a lesser extent, New York, Texas and New Mexico, claim they experience real problems related to immigration. They say the U.S. is becoming a huge "welfare magnet" where poor people come to collect free care.

Positive Effects

Others, including Simon, economist Ben Wattenberg of the American Enterprise Institute, Stephen Moore of the CATO Institute, and Linda Chavez, activist and wife of the late farm labor organizer Caesar Chavez, have pointed to immigration's positive economic effects. They suggest that there is value to low-wage labor. Many are market liberals that preach the virtues of immigration as a flow that both fills holes in the economy (by providing labor for jobs that would otherwise be unavailable) and creating new jobs (by bringing skills and high work ethics). Much of the data bears this out. Others even say that immigrants, and their low wage rates, keep US industry competitive in the world market by allowing us to lower prices relative to others. It is also suggested that immigrants pay more in taxes than they take out in social services. These conclusions, however, are based on national data, and do not consider state-by-state input. This is where the topic really looks good. There are a thousand ways to interpret the regional, national and international ef-

fects of a domestic policy like immigration. As the debate persists in the literature, it will continue to be a fertile source of ammunition for the all-important case debate.

Ethnic Issues

Immigration unquestionably has a unique effect on ethnic relations in the US. Honestly, we think this is one of the most persuasive affirmative advantages. Much literature implies a link between high immigration and black unemployment; much also says the opposite. Nonetheless, surveys of low-income, urban African-Americans, conclude that blacks believe they are displaced by immigrants. That seems like the recipe for racial violence! These minority citizens see immigrants as a threat, regardless of whether they actually are, and they blame many of their problems on them. Thus, the prospect of violence is high. On the other hand, the empirical impact of violence given the broad scope of immigration has been relatively small over the 218 years of our history. It is true that the US was founded on the melting-pot principle and, as a result, it may be hard to convince some critics that the small price paid in the form of social violence is not worth the "American ideal". Perhaps the solution is a world in which all people are viewed as citizens of a world nation? Remember that many specific countries also beg for discussion on this topic.

U.S. Actions

We must take time to consider the question of whether we should use foreign policy methods, such as foreign aid, or armed intervention, either national or multilateral, to alleviate whatever crisis may be causing so much immigration to the US. This is particularly relevant for refugee-generating areas

such as Rwanda, Haiti or Bosnia. Many people fundamentally, and philosophically for that matter, disagree with both intervention and foreign aid in principle. The literature discussing these arguments is quite extensive -- plenty to research.

Case Debates

The second reason why this topic is an excellent choice is the offer of ample opportunity for the re-birth of the case debate. Don't get me wrong, I love a good disad as much as the next person. The problem is that, even with great case-oriented topics (like the topic from last year), debaters have come to the point where the entire INC case hit is a decoy. So the 2AC answers it, the 1NR extends and the 1AR mostly ignores the case stuff because she knows that the 2NR will only extend a disadvantage or counterplan. Let me make this clear the best debaters in both high school and college recognize the value of the case debate. This recognition is part of what makes them the BEST. Now, this doesn't mean that we should hide all our DA's on case and pretend that we are really debating the case. It does mean that the negative team should work together to assault the case at every turn and those arguments that are most effective in the overall negative strategy should be extended through to the end of the debate.

Case Scenarios

I have really lost track of how many debates I have judged where the critical analysis works like this:

1. The case debate is over for the negative after the 1NR because the 2NR thinks they will win the whole thing with their "big-impact" DA's. This means that the case is granted and the impact scenarios there are 100% AFFIRMATIVE!

2. The "big-impact" DA's are

in trouble, the link cards are pretty generic and the threshold evidence is 3 years old on one and nonexistent on the other. They are good arguments but aren't really persuasive given that the 2AR minimizes risk versus the granted case advantages.

The problem with this situation is that it skews the actual debate. We should hear much more of the case in the 2NR than we have been hearing for the same reason that no 2AC would grant a disadvantage. The only way to cast doubt on the case is to, forgive me for the reminder, actually answer the scenarios. There should be as much doubt cast on the case scenarios as on the disadvantage impacts. Your coach may tell you that there should be more since the debate is usually happening on a case which you were supposed to have already researched. Don't waste the case cards just because you feel they don't hold the golden key to the ballot. Maybe case arguments aren't magical, but there is no question that they are an indispensable part of every successful negative strategy. The opportunities provided on this topic for the case debate are immense and there is no excuse for not using this situation to your argumentative advantage.

Research

Finally, this topic exceeds others as a proving ground for prepared research materials. One perfect example is the huge generic positions that are intrinsic to this topic (growth, technology, world order, etc.) that make quality backfiles critical. Needless to say, the research burden of having to replace the big positions while staying on top of the case research would certainly be overwhelming! There will also be occasions when these positions are critical to debating the "squirrels" that broad topics always invite. This year, as in all others, there is a clear need for original updated research. Broad issues should also increase the need for research training of all debaters; observing the format and content of evidence in sourcebooks will certainly help students as they prepare their own research. Be careful that you don't get overwhelmed with the vast amount of evidence available. Sourcebooks can provide a good direction for research allowing debaters to approach the literature with a "sense" of what they want to find. Further, a comparison of the various manuals also graphically demonstrates

the different views of the topic as reflected by the arguments included. A good sample of these manuals, and the citations included in them, should provide a good starting point for base and continuing research -- the secret to debate success.

While this may be the only year we correctly predict the problem area AND the topic, it is comforting to know that there are many interesting, big-impact debates coming this year. For your part, don't fight the percentages. When it comes to preparing for the immigration debate: pay attention to the case debate and the opportunities that are there, be prepared for the big generics on the affirmative and negative, and, whatever you do, research everything. That way, you see, the odds will be in your favor!

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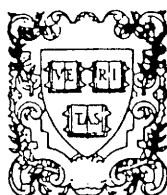
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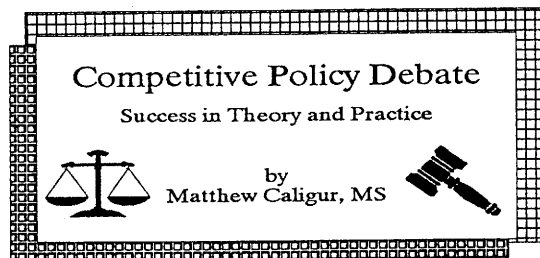
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Free markets mean free movement

Few can remember a world without passports or borders. Yet that's how it was only 80 years ago. In Europe, you needed your passport only to go to Russia or Turkey.

The freedom to travel was a part of Europe's liberal civilization. During the hundred years before World War I, most European economies enjoyed price stability—thanks to the gold standard—and an unprecedented growth in the standard of living. There were no major wars. Civil liberties and parliamentary institutions strengthened throughout Europe and seemed likely to spread over the whole world. Everyone believed that free migration promoted prosperity. Statesmen took for granted that the freedom to travel was part of the market economy.

World War I brought an end to all that. By bringing ruin to the middle classes of Europe and wreaking havoc on the liberal institutions of the European nations, the war also put an end to the freedoms of travel and residence that had fueled the phenomenal expansion of commerce and industry. Tight controls on the movement of peoples appeared along with strict curbs on the international flow of capital. In a few short years of war, individual liberty of migration disappeared.

The ideal of the classical economists was an open world economy with an international division of labor. They all acknowledged that the free movement of labor was an indispensable counterpart to the unrestricted mobility of capital. Just as tariffs and quotas resulted only in dislocating the world market and decreasing economic welfare, so too immigration controls resulted in economic stagnation and the waste of human resources.

The classical economists also saw in the control of the free movement of peoples a remnant of the mercantilist system of political economy they opposed. Under mercantilism, both physical and human capital were owned by the state. They were na-

tional resources to be exploited in the pursuit of power. Any curbs on the movement of peoples was a regression from liberal civilization and from individuals' freedom to make their own choices and live their own lives. ▽

The suspicions of the liberal economists were confirmed during the inter-war years. Throughout the world, freedom of travel and freedom of enterprise disappeared simultaneously. In Nazi Germany, above all, collectivist control of the economy meant the loss of individual freedom to travel and the forced migration of whole peoples and, in the end, policies of racial extermination. By the outbreak of World War II, men and women, instead of being able to choose where they wanted to live and work, virtually had become the property of the state they happened to live in.

What does the decline of freedom of movement and migration mean for the defense of the free market? In spite of the events of the past 60 years, conservatives have been slow to learn their lesson: The freedoms that make the market economy cannot easily be divided. Too often, those conservative free marketeers most firm in their opposition to intervention in the market by governments and labor unions have been in favor of the clumsy and inhumane control of migration.

In the U.S. and Europe, conservatives haven't followed the logic of the market economy in promoting free movement of peoples. On the contrary, they have given the defense of the free market a bad name. It is now considered a reactionary movement very different from the liberating force it was in the 19th century.

Enoch Powell, Britain's most intellectually distinguished political defender of the market economy, is also the most prominent advocate of morally repellent and unworkable proposals for the repatriation of nonwhite immigrants.

The Thatcher government in England firmly resisted the intemperate

demands of the Tory right for even stricter immigration controls. But it seemed willing to abandon Hong Kong—that oasis of market capitalism—and stripped Hong Kong's hard-working citizens, who remain British subjects, of their right to reside in the United Kingdom.

The Tories as a whole have displayed a strange blindness to cultural realities. They fail to see that in Britain today it is the Asian immigrant populations who are the last to hold the conservative virtues of hard work, business enterprise and family solidarity. It is surprising that with the entrepreneurial spirit in decline and the family in disarray in the native population in Britain, Tories have not seen in the million or so immigrant voters a natural ally in the political struggle against religious socialism.

Now that conservatives are taking a more critical view of the overextended welfare state, it is a pity that they do not also look at their policies on immigration. It is the growth of the welfare state—and war—that has strengthened demands for immigration controls. Now that the British government is trying to return a large part of responsibility for welfare to individuals and families, it is a good time to reconsider immigration policy.

A return to the pre-1914 world without frontiers is Utopian and a practical impossibility. If the defense of capitalism is to have the humane and liberating aspect it had in the heyday of the free market, however, and if conservatism is not to be a merely defensive and reactionary creed, it is high time attempts were made to relax and liberalize the controls on free movement.

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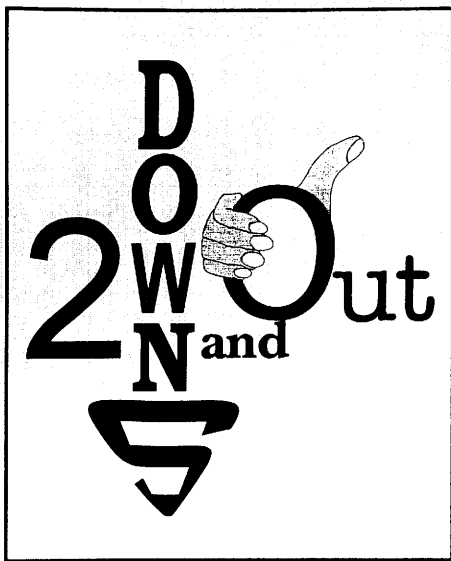

IT AIN'T FAIR

YEAH, BOYS! DEE-BAIT HAS GONE ALL TO HALE SINCE I WAS BEDATIN' YAYUH, THIS HERE COLUMN IS ABOUT WHY SPEED IS TARRIBLE. AS SEEN BY A YOKEL OUT IN KANSAS. AIN'T NO NEED FER YEW POWERFUL NASHNUL CIRKIT FELLERS TO READ THIS JUST US GOOD OL' BOYS AND GALS SITTING HERE, CHEWIN', SPITTIN' AND VOTIN' STOCK ISSUES!!

Are they gone?

All right. You and I, let's talk about what this immigration topic is really about. You've probably been sitting there rasslin' with six hundred dollars of fancy handbooks written by folks who had a vested interest in making this topic as broad and confusing as possible. I mean, if I was selling you evidence, I would be, too. And if I was selling negative handbooks, I would be trying to blow up the world also, with all the nuke wars and species extinctions I could muster.

But I'm just sitting here on my hay bale, watching the cows not worrying much about the beef d/a, and I'm still wondering what the shouting is all about. You see, this topic boils down to one specific concept.

Equity.

Now, I'm not confusing policy and value debate. Policies, of course, are based on values -- it is how we weigh advantages and

disadvantages after all. The blow up the world scenarios are based on the life value aren't they? If I respond to your nuke war with the response "Good! The whole Earth experiment was on one of God's bad weeks", then what are we discussing?

And this topic is about equity.

A second caveat -- I am not talking about equality. Equality is when all participants have sameness. A golf tournament with no handicaps awarded to the weaker golfers has equality. A golf tournament with handicaps has equity -- this is, fairness instead of sameness.

As the law has evolved, the principle of equity has replaced equality. It is the source of controversial court decisions such as busing and affirmative action, and less controversial regulations, like handicapped access to public buildings.

The key word in the resolution is *regulation*. A regulation modifies on-going behavior. A regulation that says no hats in class modifies all behavior in that class after the regulation is pronounced. Of course, if hats are out of fashion, then the regulation is rarely invoked. And if the regulation is "no beards in class" and I teach kindergarten, the regulation is never an issue. Oops, excuse me.

YAYUH. STOCK ISSUES. LIKE IS ANGUS BETTER THAN HOLSTEIN? GIVES A HOLE KNEW MEANIN' TO SLINGIN' THE BULL. DON'T IT?

There. Where was I? Now, the affirmative, no matter how twinky, is proposing a regulation that will in the future have to be enforced. Otherwise, there would be no need area. Let's say the affirmative moans about the Haitians boating to the United States. Obviously, when the policy is announced, there will be people who will have their behavior modified. If the policy keeps the Haitians out, then the

Haitians will bear the brunt of the regulation. If the policy is to open the ports to them, then many more people will have their behavior changed by the regulation. The key is to discover these parties, and see if the regulation is fair, *equitable*, to them.

Let's take a twinky case -- ban Chinese dissidents. Some joker has a quote that letting the survivors of Tianamen Square find refuge here is hurting the relations of China and the US. Fair enough; check ye olde file -- no mucho. Meditate for the moment on the evils of mixing languages, and then consider the question of equity.

Obviously, the affirmative is making a regulation that intends to accomplish one of two policies; either to gain from the Chinese mess specifically, or in general to apply this policy to any dissident immigrants that may cause tension between the governments.

Let's take the latter case. What will be the results of such a regulation?

1. A violation of equal treatment before the law. Chinese that have entered the United States before the regulation should be immune to deportation; to deport them after they have been granted asylum would be grossly unjust. Those after the regulation are imposed cannot immigrate. What are the differences between these two classes of immigrants except for the time factor? Nothing.

So what? The courts will serve their protective function and declare the action invalid. The affirmative will declare this a matter of fiat. I really don't believe this part of fiat power -- the regulation is established by action of the executive branch, and its approval by the courts is a second action after fiat power has expired. But let's grant them the power to change the court's mind. The result is.

2. Court stripping. The vital component of justice is *stare decisis*: that is, that similar cases must be treated similarly. The

fact that the immigrants are only distinguished from each other by the time of their entrance to this country is not significant until the court is forced by the power of fiat to recognize it. The affirmative must force courts to recognize time of application as a critical component in admitting any immigrant. Therefore, any immigrants may be deported, years after entry, merely because the government has reason to believe the current foreign government would be happier to have them back. There is much further to go, with some good law school research, you find the future of totalitarian government argument easy and believable to reach.

TOTALITARIAN CEREAL IS SUFFERING FROM POOR STOCK FUTURES. KELLOGGS, GENERAL MILLS, EVEN CAPTAIN MILLS STOCKS ARE VOTIN' ISSUES.

Whew, those big impacts had them coming back like a 2AR to a missed turn. Now, use your little grey cells. Consider that second case, that ONLY the Chinese will be the subject of this regulation. Does that sound like a violation of civil rights? Not if they are not citizens, the affirmative claims. Now that is a strange declaration, since the courts have upheld due process for immigrants in the matter of deportation. Further, if we ignore that, the prospect of Japanese -- American WWII settlement camps is easy to invoke. If Chinese immigration is displeasing to the current Chinese government, we should send ALL Chinese back, correct? Surely the fact that millions of them were born here and are American citizens is unimportant, if the Chinese government wants them back, then they should go. And why not their property, too? Send all their savings to China, and sell their property and send it back, too. What STOPS IT? The courts cannot, because fiat power has stripped them of ability to stop this injustice.

But, that's not all. Equity is

the central consideration of ALL immigrants while in the United States. Green cards become worthless by the action of the affirmative case. Immigrants will lose the right to defend themselves in a civil suit. The affirmative cases that develop the inequities of current law can all be run as disadvantages to such a system.

Probably the best reason to study and develop the equity concept is because it is anathema to the debaters who like to run from debate. It is the type of argument they call "stupid" because they are forced to consider it. And if they can beat the argument... Well, I really don't think a debater who would run a specific country or specific regulation case is a good enough debater to beat it.

Do I think these arguments are unanswerable? Of course not. But the pickier the affirmative, the more trouble they pose. And if that means the affirmatives debating this topic will have to discuss the issues, that's all the better.

ANNUAL REPORT 1993-94

This report summarizes the number of new members and degrees added by each chapter during the school year 1993-94. It does not reflect the current strength of each chapter. The number of new members and degrees added by each chapter appears in the column "New." The "Total" column indicates accumulated total of members and degrees for the chapter since its founding or since it last received the Leading Chapter Award.

The column marked '94 designates the chapter rank as of June 30, 1994. The column '93 designates the chapter rank the previous year. The special symbols are defined above the summary.

Each year the top chapter in accumulated members and degrees, not more than one to a district, receives a special chapter award for excellence in speech. When a chapter has received the Leading Chapter Award its accumulated total returns to zero and begins a new Leading Chapter Award record. The symbol ('83) indicates the last time a chapter was awarded the Leading Chapter Award. A school may not receive the Leading Chapter Award unless it has been a member for five years or a period of five years has passed since last receiving the award. If it lost its Charter or has been suspended or expelled or failed to add new members and degrees during the school year ending June 30, 1994 it is also ineligible.

A tie in the accumulated total for the Leading Chapter Award is broken in favor of the school which enrolled the greater number of new members and degrees.

The average enrollment of new members and degrees of all chapters during 1993-94 was 34.57. The average enrollment of new members and degrees for 1992-93 was 33.47.

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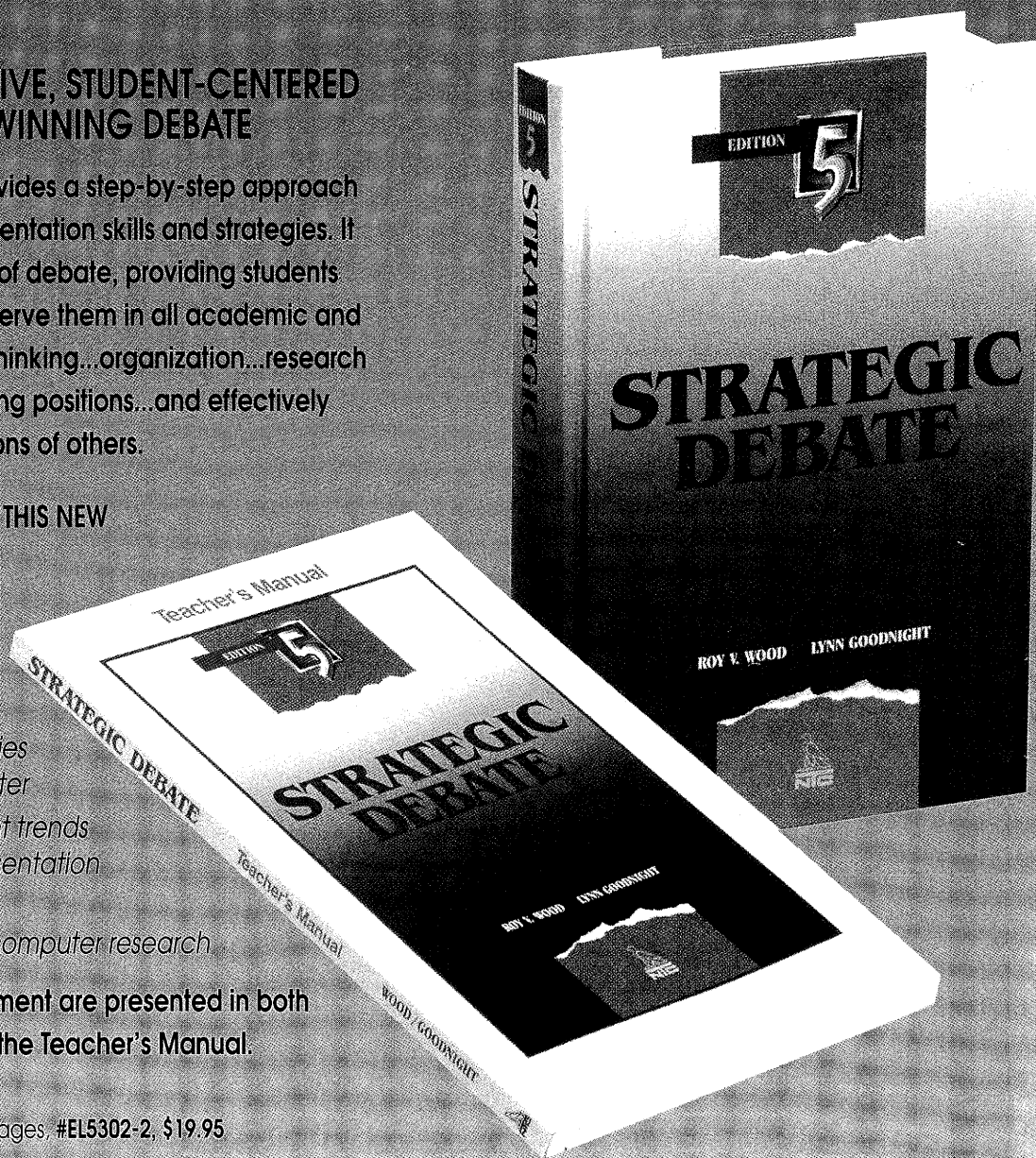
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
