SYNOPSIS OF THE PROBLEM AREAS FOR 2011-2012

I

PROBLEM AREA I: CYBER SECURITY

Resolved: The United States federal government should establish rules of engagement governing its use of cyber warfare.

The possibility of cyber war has escalated for over a decade but has recently become a reality. The United States is more vulnerable to a cyber attack than other nations. Our dependence on cyberspace for our critical infrastructure, communication and economy puts us at risk. Though we are one of the better-equipped nations to wage cyber war, there are no rules of engagement. Rules exist for conventional and nuclear war but those same rules don't exist for cyber warfare. The United States should take the lead and establish its own rules of engagement. Issues are familiar from debates regarding conventional war, but students would get to examine them through the new lens of cyber war. Affirmatives may argue no first use and acceptable/unacceptable targets including civilian populations and specific industries like banking or power generation. Other affirmative issues include the use of logic bombs and trapdoors in computer systems and a host of offensive and defensive policies. Advantage ground extends to the US relationship with other countries or the obligation to assist other countries and what

US accountability should be with non-state actors. Negatives could have disadvantage ground including privacy, business confidence, hegemony, economy and politics. Counterplan ground includes international actors, private actors and application of conventional war practices to cyber war. Critique ground could include issues as statism and biopower. The United States is currently attempting to determine our policies and practices that foster a multitude of proposals for plans of action. There isn't a quick fix; the fruition of policy or legislative discussion is years away. Now is the time for debaters to examine our direction in the area of cyber warfare.

II

PROBLEM AREA II: SOUTHEAST ASIA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its development assistance to Southeast Asia.

Southeast Asia, which consists of Burma, Brunei, Cambodia, East Timor, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam, is one of the most dynamic regions in the world. It is surrounded and heavily influenced by the military and economic might of China, the booming population of India and the industrial strength of Japan. However,

Southeast Asia faces several unique infrastructural, environmental and other developmental challenges. Japan, China, and Australia have recognized the potential for growth and productivity in the region and are substantially involved there. Their assistance has not generated adequate results. Likewise, according to studies from the Department of Defense and the Heritage Foundation, the current level of United States assistance is insufficient to meet the developmental needs of the area. Now is the critical time for the United States to increase its engagement if it wishes to remain a dominant actor in the region. Affirmatives could use a variety of mechanisms including: loans, grants, technical aid, access to capital markets and investments. Such assistance could help one or more nations improve their infrastructure, economy, environment, education system and agricultural output. Negatives have several unique areas for ground and could dispute the effectiveness of developmental assistance, the appropriateness of the United States as an actor, and the morality of assisting an area that is wrought with human rights abuses.

III

PROBLEM AREA III: SPACE POLICY

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its exploration and/or development of space beyond the Earth's mesosphere.

Space exploration fires people's imaginations. The 1969 moon landings rank as one of the highest achievements of modern civilization. There is something uncanny about the human need to explore the universe. Discussing space exploration and development would have the same effect. A topic like this could spark the imagination of potential debaters, and the easy accessibility of materials would make the learning

curve on the subject manageable. This is a critical time in the United States space program. The status of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is in limbo, especially concerning human spaceflight. The Space Shuttle is retiring in the fall of 2010, with no possible US replacement available before 2015. In addition, NASA has an unclear mandate/direction to explore either the Moon or Mars. This is balanced against NASA's recent success with robotic exploration, such as the Mars rovers and the Hubble Space Telescope, as well as increased private sector growth. Affirmative cases could include astronomical surveys, setting new goals for human spaceflight, using new probes to examine celestial bodies in our solar system or beyond, and developing space economies. The technological and economic benefits of the space program are well documented. Negative arguments could include the increased militarization of space, the significant cost in money and resources, timeframe arguments and the need to focus more on problems concerning the Earth, such as climate change.

IV

PROBLEM AREA IV: INDIA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its cooperation with India in one or more of the following areas: civilian space programs, nuclear proliferation, trade.

In addition to being one of the world's largest and fastest-growing economies, India is also one of the world's most populous nations, ranking second, behind China, with over 1.1 billion people. India is often characterized as a nascent major power and "natural partner" of the United States. Since 2004, Washington and New Delhi have pursued a "strategic partnership" based on shared values such as democracy, pluralism

and rule of law. Numerous economic, security and global initiatives, including plans for civilian nuclear cooperation, are underway. Given this policy emphasis, it is a perfect time for high school debaters to examine US foreign policy towards India. Affirmatives could include decreasing controls on technology exports to India, reducing restrictions on arms sales to India, reducing restrictions on nuclear fuel exports to India, increasing US-India cooperation in space, increase US-India cooperation on counterterrorism, increase US-India cooperation on renewable energy development, negotiating a US-India bilateral trade treaty and support India as a permanent member of the UN Security Council. Advantages could include the

specifics for the individual plans, as well as increased US-Indian relations and effects on international security vis-à-vis China, Russia, Afghanistan and Pakistan. Negatives could argue that increasing cooperation with India would negatively affect the nonproliferation regime, fuel world instability by increasing competition with and concern from China and promote regional instability by tipping the delicate balance of US-Indian-Pakistani relations. In addition, negatives could run disadvantages relating to the effects of the various plans on the US and world economy, as well as on the US federal budget. The standard kritiks that are used on foreign policy topics would also be available on this topic as well.

V

PROBLEM AREA V: CHINA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its economic engagement with the People's Republic of China on one or more of the following issues: trade, currency, environment.

There are powerful reasons for the United States to build closer ties with China. The United States and China are the two largest economies in the world when Gross Domestic Product is measured on a purchasing power basis. Simultaneously, there are reasons for caution, given the human rights conditions and central control of the economy in China. Former Secretary of the Treasury, Henry Paulson, in the September/October 2008 issue of Foreign Affairs entitled, "Strengthening US-Chinese Ties: A Strategic Economic Engagement on Trade and the Environment," explains "economic engagement" as promoting interdependence between the US and Chinese economies. He also explains "economic engagement" by contrasting it with the alternatives. "There are three possible ways for the United States and China to pursue their economic and trade relations: robust engagement, dispute resolution through multilateral and bilateral enforcement measures or punitive legislation." Possible affirmative cases could focus on promoting product safety, direct foreign investment, management of currencies, protection of the environment, workers' rights, respecting intellectual property rights and inclusion of China in major international forums such as the G8. Negative positions could focus on human rights issues, concern that a stronger economy would strengthen the Chinese military, changes in the balance of power in Asia and tensions within the World Trade Organization. ■

PUBLIC FORUM

A Closer Look at Public Forum Debate Topic Selection

When Public Forum Debate began in 2003, it was designed to engage community members and new groups of students in the world of debate. The resolutions which frame Public Forum debates are “ripped from the headlines,” involving relevant and timely issues that educate and involve the community on significant public issues. Because Public Forum was designed to target community members and new debaters, the resolutions serve a critical role in ensuring the outreach and appeal of Public Forum Debate.

Today, seven years after the creation of Public Forum Debate, the event is thriving. District participation in Public Forum rose to nearly 5,000 students during 2009-2010, more than double since the event’s inception, and national tournament entries in PFD rose correspondingly. Throughout this growth process, as Public Forum Debate resolutions have begun to affect more and more people, the process for determining those resolutions has rightfully garnered more attention and scrutiny. Understanding the way Public Forum resolutions are created may help shed light on the event and the way it operates. Further, it may help students and coaches as they seek to analyze the resolution that frames their debates each month.

The NFL begins the process of developing resolutions for Public Forum with a direct solicitation for topic ideas from June 1 to August 1.

Any member of the speech and debate community may submit topic ideas to the NFL for consideration at any point during the year by e-mailing suggestions to nfl@nflonline.org. Once the list of potential topics is compiled, the NFL executive director considers those suggestions from the membership, consults the list of past topic areas, reviews the headline news and ongoing societal issues, reviews potential partnership and grant opportunities, and consults colleagues to determine an appropriate topic area for focus. Generally, topic ideas will fall into, but are not limited to, one of ten categories (see Figure A).

In some months, potential sponsorship relationships and grant opportunities are considered by the executive director. These opportunities can play an essential role in advancing the mission of the NFL and further enhancing the support available in Public Forum Debate. The NFL Board has encouraged the executive director to seek out only those grant and sponsorship opportunities that fit the parameters outlined in Figure B and meet the standards noted above. NFL rules do not allow potential sponsors to unilaterally dictate resolution wording or specific topic areas. The executive director, with the assistance of his wording advisory committee, always determines the final wording of a resolution.

Next in the process, the executive director engages the opinions of a wording advisory committee. Public Forum wording advisers consist of

former debate coaches with established expertise in the semantics of debate resolutions. The 2010-2011 Advisory Committee possesses an outstanding cachet of debate experience and success. Current members include Tim Averill (MA), Jason Kline (NC), Kandi King (TX), Donus Roberts (SD), and Cherian Koshy (WI). The Public Forum Advisory Committee's deliberation is guided by a number of considerations, including the 2006 recommendations of the Public Forum Committee. The committee proposed that the wording of Public Forum Debate resolutions should be evaluated under the following principles: timeliness, debatability, clarity, availability of research on both sides, fair ground, balance (avoiding side bias), media relevance, community and student interest, and public understandability (also known as the “reasonable person standard”).

Developing Public Forum Debate resolutions according to this process helps maintain the integrity and accessibility of the event while securing the requisite support to allow the event to grow. Simply put, it ensures the best possible resolution for the Public Forum Debate community. A couple of key attributes further this aim. Writing resolutions throughout the year with maximum flexibility helps ensure that resolutions remain timely and relevant. The recommendations of the committee and the expertise of the executive director help ensure

that resolutions are challenging, yet debatable. The involvement of the debate community, through the topic solicitation process and participation of an advisory committee of coaches, with careful oversight by the national office, helps ensure that the resolution is determined with impartiality and fairness. Although Public Forum Debate may still be relatively new, the popularity and prestige of the event renders it one of the NFL's most effective vehicles for student outreach and community involvement. As more and more people engage in PFD as both participants and critics, the resolutions will remain vital to ensuring that the playing field remains level for all. The wording committee and office of the executive director are committed to maintaining a fair wording process and producing quality Public Forum Debate resolutions. Doing so paves the way for new generations of people to engage in critical discussions of public interest for years to come.

In conclusion, the NFL hopes that by sharing the topic selection process for LD (last month's issue), PFD, and Policy (next month's issue), all members will actively play their role in each unique method of selection.


Protocols for Selecting Public Forum Debate Topic Areas and Resolutions

(From the Spring 2010 NFL Board of Directors Meeting)

- A. There shall be no general topic area or specific topic repeated within any one school year.
- B. The Public Forum Debate Wording Committee will be selected to determine the resolution wording. Members of the committee will have expertise in the semantics of debate resolutions.
- C. The NFL national office will accept topic ideas throughout the year from the debate community, augmented by an aggressive and active call for ideas from June 1 to August 1.
- D. The executive director shall retain control over topic area selection and final wording approval.
- E. No organization providing funding to the National Forensic League through sponsorship or a grant will be allowed to unilaterally dictate a specific topic area.
- F. No organization providing funding to the National Forensic League through sponsorship or a grant shall be allowed to determine the wording of a resolution.
- G. No grant or sponsorship dollars will be accepted from any organization that does not maintain the honor and integrity of the National Forensic League in accordance with the codified NFL sponsorship policies.

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
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Cover Story

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THE YEAR OF THE MEMBER

The Chinese Zodiac follows a 12-year lunar cycle, featuring animals as its signs. Certain traits of these animals are used to describe people born during those years, and festivities celebrate those qualities. As the National Forensic League enters its 86th year of training youth for leadership, the Chinese Year of the Tiger is an appropriate metaphor for a focus on membership. The number of NFL schools has remained rather stagnant over the past 25 years. Despite grassroots recruitment efforts, for each school gained, one leaves. In the spirit of the brave and aggressive Zodiac Tiger, the NFL board and staff have resolved to courageously work to recruit and retain chapters by adding value to school membership and to offer assistance to struggling coaches.

In 1925, a visionary group of educators created a membership organization concept that recognizes young people for their achievements in communication activities. Today, students enjoy opportunities from myriad activities and causes, while educators face increased challenges of being asked to do more with less. This means we must make the case for speech communication as providing premier educational benefits, and tailor school membership benefits to maximize the value of resources. Schools who leave or do not join the league often perceive membership in

the NFL as superfluous and requiring additional work. However, the NFL has made great strides in the past eight years toward making point entry easier, and providing a robust menu of coaching resources and professional development opportunities. The Year of the Member will see a dramatic increase in the resources and services we offer our schools.

Perhaps the most erroneous misconception of the league is that its focus is the national tournament. The national tournament certainly provides the benefit of bringing students together from across the country to experience the myriad messages they listen to from one another. The NFL, however, is so much more than one tournament. In fact, it offers a continuous recognition system for student participation in every other local, state, and national forensic organization. The NFL also offers a bounty of resources and professional development opportunities for its coaches.

Grassroots Efforts to Uproot Myths

Coaches have a stake in promoting league membership to area schools, so the NFL can leverage its national reach to advocate the value of speech and debate education. Additionally, more schools added means it's more cost-effective to develop more resources for the benefit of all schools. State

and local associations tend to have much wider participation than the NFL districts overlapping those areas, yet for an existing forensic program, adding NFL membership adds only negligible cost. However, it’s up to all of us—board members, staff, district committee members, and yes, each and every coach—to dispel the myths and espouse the wider benefits of NFL membership.

Another membership-based organization embracing Year of the Tiger is Rotary International, where president Ray Klinginsmith challenges its community clubs and its regional districts to be “bigger, better, and bolder.” This would be a great mantra for NFL districts to ask of themselves. Some NFL district tournaments are simply treated as a means to get to nationals, while others are a ceremonious celebration of local participation and talent. District committees should ponder whether their tournament is simply a means to an end, or if it can be—in some ways—an end unto itself. The latter mentality encourages growth and doesn’t just perpetuate the perception that smaller, newer programs are invited to participate in the district tournament so the larger, more established school can qualify students to nationals. While that certainly is not the case, imagine a younger program’s perception of that

glass ceiling. In addition to honoring national qualifiers, districts should recognize students and schools for their growth in the activity, and for meeting milestones.

Hear Us Roar!

At the summer 2009 District Leadership Conference in Ripon, Wisconsin, participants expressed their concerns and shared their ideas for promoting growth and vitality in the league. After a year of strategic planning by the staff and policymaking by the board, inspired by that conference, a number of enhancements to league policies and services have enhanced the value of NFL membership:

- Establishment of the online fundraising portal, *GiveYouthAVoice.org*. This Web site allows NFL schools to raise funds through an easy and secure online interface, similar to sites that allow donors to give directly to individual causes. All funds donated go directly to schools.
- Continuation of the *Give Them a Voice* **district grant program**, which allows a district to describe a specific strategic growth initiative on an easy one-page form, and apply for a \$500 grant. The district simply needs to complete a one-

page midterm report and final report to be eligible for future funds.

- Development of an **online Event Experience portal**, to include novice training tools, which include a concise event overview, bibliography of resources, instructional videos and final round samples, lesson plans, and a shopping list of supplies. With this development, the national tournament interp cutting list will be made freely available to schools. Access will be behind a password-protected area of the Web site. A similar coaching portal will have tools for administering, promoting, and defending a squad’s program.
- Expansion of **professional development opportunities** to include an **online judge training portal** and collaborative e-learning space for coaches. The coach accreditation program, online professional development, summer workshop scholarships, national tournament clinics, and school faculty seminars will continue.
- **Lifting all point recording caps**, allowing students to have a more complete record of their participation in forensic activities, and for coaches/schools to see a

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NFL founder Bruno E. Jacob constantly promoted the value of individual membership as a premier feature of the NFL. As a coach, my students were motivated by their accrual of points and achieving new degrees of membership. Dropping point recording caps will go a long way toward keeping students engaged

longer, and chronicling their participation more fully. What's more, the new point recording framework finally makes sense: it places premier value on participation in NFL main events, while still rewarding participation in other forensic contests. For coaches who wish to motivate students to participate in events they might qualify to nationals, the premium point value will help those efforts.

Membership in the NFL has always been a badge of honor to recognize talent and drive in students who do not often reap the glory that athletes in spectator sports often enjoy. Forensics indeed is a sport, albeit academic, and the NFL is rising to the challenge of retaining, recruiting, and supporting its coaches to make membership an "I'm winning" proposition for everyone. Every coach can win with the instructional resources, programming tools, and professional development opportunities the NFL has available.

Almost any reader of *Rostrum* by virtue of reading this publication believes in the power of forensics to change lives for the better. The NFL is here to support that mission, to build the clout of this amazing academic activity to astounding proportions!

correlation between involvement and achievement. The caps existed to encourage programs to diversify student involvement in both debate and speech, but that wasn't the reality. To compute point leaders and Academic All Americans, a new awards structure considers holistic achievement for the top one percent point leaders in each state as well as a National All American point leader, in addition to separate honors for point leaders in each category.

- **Revamping the point structure** with a simpler, more direct way of understanding values assigned to events (*see sidebar, opposite page*). Instead of three tiers of speech events, two scales that place a premium on participation in NFL events, but still reward participation in non-NFL events will be used, which allows official recognition of participation in Parliamentary Debate, for example. The online

points database already accepts the new values. Points recorded under the old framework will not change retroactively, but since caps are being lifted, ultimately, students in the future will be able to record more points over time than students in the past, so this will work itself out in the next few years.

- **Broadening the concept of service point recording** to encourage community engagement by students. In addition to public presentations at civic organizations and other projects recognized for point recording in the past, students will be allowed to explore other avenues of service. These avenues may be an outgrowth of a debate topic, such as helping in a soup kitchen to understand poverty better. They may include time spent coaching a middle school forensics program to sustain future demand for the high school program. Service and leadership are two key

pillars of the NFL Code of Honor, and this will raise the stature of what an NFL honor society does through action, as well as in words. This allows education to transcend theory and become experiential. Action offers value-added outcomes for a coach educator to include in his/her advocacy arsenal in defending a program.

- **Membership continuum:** Online point recording for NJFL (middle school) and alumni through Pi Kappa Delta membership bring students in from grades 6-8, and keep them engaged in a partner honorary society beyond graduation from high school.

In the aforementioned initiatives, a common thread emerges: a **robust and cohesive Web presence**. The current NFL Web site has been in place for about half a decade, and it's time for a more **intuitive and interactive interface**. To bring additional resources to NFL members, several other sites were rolled out in the past year, and those will be folded into a new site, and easier to find. This new site will be rolled out within the next six months.

A Solid Product

For a large part of its history, the NFL's austerity as an honorary society has encouraged a certain perception of elitism, not unlike the mysticism that surrounds the Chinese Zodiac. To remain vital in the 21st century, and to reclaim ground in the advocacy of speech communication education, the NFL plans to adapt as a not-for-profit charitable organization that provides membership services to schools across the country. Adaptation must include retaining schools, encouraging programs that are struggling, and finding existing forensic squads that are not involved in the NFL sphere. While the national office stands at the ready for this intense outreach, we cannot do it alone, and appeal to our coaches to march with us and expand our ranks on this journey through the Year of the Member. ■

Competition Points

Students earn points in two classifications: for participation in NFL main events, and for participation in non-NFL (including supplemental and consolation) events. There are three areas in which points are recorded—debate, speech and service—and there are no caps in any area or event. The following chart represents how students earn points in interscholastic contests (the NFL district and national tournaments still have bonus scales).

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Looking Back



Harland B. Mitchell Trophy Awarded to Policy Debate Champions



If you've been to the national tournament any year since 1978, you've probably heard the name "Harland B. Mitchell" announced as the Policy Debate champions accepted their first place trophies. But you may not know the story behind H. B. Mitchell.

Mitchell was a legendary speech and debate coach from Oklahoma and a trailblazer in the NFL. During his 39-year career, he coached eighteen state debate champions, three national debate champions, three national debate runners-up, and a national champion in Extemp.

A selfless coach and mentor, as well as a longtime member of the NFL Board of Directors, Mitchell unknowingly summarized his storied career in his book, *Here's the Question*: "It is only the coach who has the desire and the willingness to 'pay the price' who will succeed. Successful debaters...are the product of an expert and interested craftsman."

In light of his superlative success and service, Mitchell was named as the foremost debate coach in America by the NFL in 1960, the only time the award has ever been given, and recognized as an original member of the NFL Hall of Fame.

The NFL applauds the legacy of its own pioneer, Mr. H. B. Mitchell. ■

COACH PROFILE

REBEKAH FOSTER

● ***Describe your first NFL experience.*** My first truly NFL experience would have to be attending the 1996 Tarheels nationals in North Carolina my senior year of high school. To be at a place with a plethora of debaters—people and peers who acted and thought the same as I—was wonderful. It felt like a home. The team bonded through hours of competition, hours of non-competition, and just plain experiencing the event together. I have fond memories of playing cards with debaters from southern Nevada; I still have a golf ball from the mini-golf course we played at one night; and most distinctly, I have a pure and utter love for the national tournament. To see so many people gathered together for one common cause and goal, to see everybody in their element and at the peak of competition is heartwarming and life affirming. Plus, it is just so much fun to be somewhere new and bond with new people every year.

● ***When did you decide to teach? Was coaching always part of the plan?*** After attending my first education course in my sophomore year of college, I knew that I would forever be a part of the profession; though if you were to ask my mother, she would say that I am a born teacher as I often came

home and played school with my stuffed animals. Coaching was not always part of my career plan; however, when it came time to student teach, I wanted to return to my hometown, and it so happened that my own high school coach wanted me to student teach with her—including her debate class. So, from that point on, debate was part of the plan. I student taught in a debate class, continued assistant coaching at the same school until I received a job at that school, and then began teaching a debate class at that same school.

● ***Did you have a forensics mentor? Describe him or her.*** Kim Cuevas was my forensics mentor. While I loved debate from the first moment of my freshman year of high school, it wasn't until my junior year that our team had a steady coach. Kim is an amazing teacher and coach. I learned quite a bit from her as a student, but much more when we coached together. She taught me to both personalize and not personalize the winning of my students. She taught me to be a strong leader and to thoroughly know the competition rules and to run a tournament from start to finish. She also helped me to value every event our league offers and work with students to reach their greatest potential as competitors and people.

COACH PROFILE.....

- ***What is unique about Reno High School?*** Reno High School is truly amazing, but perhaps I am biased as I spent most of my schooling and teaching here. We are a strong school all around—sports, academics, and most certainly debate. Since my senior year of high school, our school has won our league competition every year, sometimes earning twice the number of competition points as the second place school. We are also a school that values learning and education; it is cool to be smart at Reno High, and I think that is part of why we have a strong and enduring team.

- ***What is the best part about your job? What is the most challenging?*** The answer to both of these questions is the same: the students. Interacting with students, teaching them something new and watching the lights flash inside as they think of new ideas, is indescribable. As a debate coach, I have the lucky chance of watching them grow over several years: they start as little freshman wary of their new school and their new lives; they graduate as young adults, capable of tackling the hardest of choices and strangest of environments. Debate pushes students to do and be something they never dreamed they could.

On the flip side, students can disappoint you; they can struggle against you and themselves and make poor choices. You watch them grow and you guide them, but they are still teenagers and still make mistakes that can break your heart. Plus, they move on after they graduate, sometimes leaving a sad hole in your heart or on your team.

- ***One of your students was third in Commentary this year at nationals. What does it take to coach someone “to the stage”?*** To me, coaching is taking someone’s innate talent, helping them recognize this talent, and giving them opportunities to reach their potential. This particular student is truly amazing and a natural orator. What he needed was constant confidence, specific feedback, and time—time to practice, time to think, time to compete. Coaching is about individualizing assistance and help according to each student’s needs, talents, desires, work ethic, and abilities. Practice makes perfect, but confidence and adult reassurance is important as well for allowing that student the chance to succeed in competition and to reach that stage.
- ***How has being involved in forensics changed you, both in and out of the classroom?*** I have

been involved with forensics for more than half of my life; the very essence of the activity is such a part of my soul that is hard to determine the impact it has had on my life in and out of the classroom. Certainly it has made a strong teacher because it has made me a critical thinker who can adapt to change at the spur of a moment. The ability to see and argue both sides of an issue is a strong skill necessary for success anywhere. Furthermore, the lifetime friendships I have made because of debate—the students and teachers at my own school and at other schools—is what truly makes forensics an important and life-changing experience.

- ***Someday, when you look back on your career, what do you want to be able to say?*** I would love to be able to say that I have made a difference, that the time and energy I have put forth has been welcomed, appreciated, and loved by someone. I hope that through debate I can help students figure out who they are, what they love, and how to achieve their goals. It does not matter to me if my students win if they give it their all, open their minds to new ideas, and learn how to compete and live with grace. ■

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

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Coaching a Paperless Debate Team

Last July, we decided to convert the Westminster squad to paperless debating. I had read about it and talked to some college colleagues who had made the switch and was convinced that it was workable and worthwhile, but I was a little nervous. Would the students be at a competitive disadvantage? Would switching to paperless require more technical expertise than I have (which is almost none)? Would judges and competitors be comfortable with the switch? After a year, I am happy to report that the transition has been great. We discovered some problems along the way but, overall, I am really glad that we made the switch. In this article, I want to discuss some of the benefits and drawbacks of paperless debate.

Benefits:

Travel is easier. We no longer have to bring tubs, printers, printing supplies or carts with us to tournaments. On flying trips, we only have one carry-on per person so we no longer have to check tubs and cross our fingers that they will arrive on time. On driving trips, we are able to load the bus quickly and get on our way. At the end of the day, students close their laptops and we simply leave the tournament. I do not think that I was fully aware of how tiring

it was to tote around hundreds of pounds of paper at tournaments until it was gone. The students have told me that trips are more fun for them and I know that they are much easier on the coaches.

Travel is much cheaper. Instead of needing two buses for local trips, we can often get by with just one. We no longer pay luggage fees at airports. We can rent smaller, cheaper vehicles on flying trips. We do not have to constantly purchase copies, ink, paper, printers, accordions, tubs, file folders and carts. Even with the initial expense of purchasing laptops, we saved quite a bit of money.

Coaches have more time to coach and debaters have more time to prep. In between rounds, we simply walk to the next debate without struggling to clean up, get a cart, wait for the elevator and then set everything up in the new room. The debaters always have all of their files with them and we can just get down to work. We no longer waste time printing files. I cannot possibly count all of the hours I used to spend printing, copying, and sorting files before and during tournaments. Anyone who has fought with a semi-working printer or a copier can imagine how nice it is to just hit "send" with a new file.

Most of the debaters are more organized. Debaters can no longer

leave the 1AC in their hotel room, forget to pick up updates, leave crucial pieces of evidence behind in their competition rooms or misfile and lose things in their tubs. They can have messy electronic tubs but a good search program on their computers can make that manageable. Overall, we have lost far less evidence and students who used to have organizational problems can focus on debate, instead of looking for things.

We can create more comprehensive files. If a debater wants to have multiple copies of the same evidence for different files, it is not a problem. For instance, several of our 2As and 2Ns have their own copies of our critique answers so that the 2As can organize them one way and the 2Ns can prep against critical affirmatives differently. We can also compile massive files like “impact defense” with relative ease. Before the paperless switch, all of those projects would have been too time intensive or too costly to make sense.

Some drawbacks and tips for overcoming them:

The transition took some work. We made the decision mid-summer and were totally paperless by the first tournament so we got it done relatively quickly. It took about six weeks of constantly converting

files to make it work. It was worth it but it did cut into our topic work at the beginning of the season. All of our files had been turned out in a completely electronic format (only Word documents; cards from books were scanned and converted) for several years so it was much faster for us than for a team that was still relying on copies. Now that camps are totally electronic and that evidence

is all available on the NDCA web site (<http://www.debatecoaches.org/page/open-evidence-project>), a team could download most of the back files that they need to convert them. By “convert” I mean underlining or highlighting carefully on screen, eliminating indexes, cleaning up the document map, eliminating a number

of page breaks and making some of the other small changes that make paperless files work smoothly.

Some debaters got lazier about file prep. Our hard working teams realized that they needed to do just as much work prepping an electronic file as a paper one. Some others were content to take files that had been prepped by other teams, something that was impossible with paper copies. I think that it was particularly true for the younger teams. Students who had never been through the experience of working on a file and seeing the benefits of really knowing it well did not understand how much they were sacrificing by just taking work done by others. For next year, we are going to be much stricter about only allowing teams to download un-prepped files. I also plan to ask teams to bring up files and I will look at the level of prep, much like I used to browse through paper tubs.

Some of our teams annoyed judges. Our older teams got very good at quickly saving and transferring files. They were also careful to make sure that they always made their evidence available on viewing computers. Some of the younger teams were not as good at it. They wasted time during rounds transferring files or would not use a viewing computer. I realized that I needed to create paperless drills

for the students. Putting together a speech, saving it to the desktop, using Dropbox or a jump drive to put it on a partner's computer and the viewing computer in an efficient manner is something that we need to practice.

Flowing skills can decline for paperless teams. Students can get too dependent on getting a transcript of a speech on a viewing computer and miss arguments that are not on the screen. We lost more debates last year by randomly dropping things than usual. Debate is an oral communication activity so I am unsympathetic to complaints that a debater owes the other team a complete script. Everyone should have access to all of the evidence, but analytical arguments that are not on the computer should still be encouraged. The competitive incentive to get back to better flowing corrected this problem for many of our teams. For others, I plan to set up drills or practice debates where the opponent makes a number of arguments that are not on the computer.

Managing the technology was sometimes difficult. I labeled every laptop and charger and kept a sign out sheet of who had what. We also had clear rules against downloading games or music or otherwise using the debate laptops for non-debate purposes. Debaters were also supposed to turn laptops back in to me after tournament (unless they worked out a deal with me to use them for writing new files). Nevertheless, I would find squad computers left here and there around the school, or have

to clean off prohibited programs, or deal with students losing chargers. I basically concluded that some of these problems were inevitable. Just like some teams are more responsible with their tubs than others, some are more responsible with their computers. The overall amount of time that I spent dealing with tech problems was still far less than I used to spend dealing with paper.

After a few more years, I am sure that we will all learn much more about effectively implementing paperless debate. Community norms will crop up that will help everyone get more comfortable with the transition. For our squad, it was a very worthwhile experiment.

Our squad started out the season using the Whitman system and switched to Synergy in the spring. Both work well and Aaron and Alex have written very helpful manuals. ■

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2009-10 CHARTER CHAPTER REPORT

This report summarizes the number of *new* members and degrees added by each charter chapter during the school year 2009-10. It does **not** reflect the current strength of each chapter. The “**total**” column indicates accumulated members and degrees since the chapter founding or the Leading Chapter Award.

The column marked **'10** designates the chapter rank as of August 31, 2010. The column **'09** designates the chapter rank the previous year.

Each year the top chapter in accumulated members and degrees, not more than one in a district, receives the Leading Chapter Award; then its accumulated

total returns to zero and it begins a new record. The symbol (**'04**) indicates the last time a chapter won the Leading Chapter Award. A school may not receive the Leading Chapter Award unless it has been a member for five years *or* five years has passed since last receiving the award. If a school loses its charter status, becomes suspended or expelled, or fails to add new members and degrees during the school year, it is ineligible to receive the Leading Chapter Award. A tie in the accumulated total for the Leading Chapter Award is broken in favor of the school which enrolled the greater number of new members and degrees during that school year. This report does not contain the records of provisional or member schools.



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
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
