## Your Chapter Standing

There is real significance in the chapter standing compiled each year. That is why most of this issue of The Rostrum is devoted to it. This record constitutes an important index of two attributes of a good chapter. It marks the chapter which maintains extensive pro grams of speech activity, for without such program they cannot qual ify many students for membership and degrees. It also marks those chapters which take an active interest in the League and in the advancement of their own members.

To the chapters now near the bottom of their groups a special word of encouragement is addressed. Last place offers greater opportunity for advancement than any other position. Rapid advance is really easier, too, once you determine to and start to advance. The enrollment of just a few more members and degrees will send such chapter up five or ten places. Just for the fun of it, turn to the record and see how many chapters would have advanced significantly had they enrolled five more degrees last year.

The way to advance the standing of your chapter has often been stated, but bears repeating. Plan and carry through as extensive a speech program as local circumstances allow-and don't underestimate those circumstances. Enroll every qualified member as soon as he qualifies. Twenty points are now required for membership and if a student earns them fairly he is entitled to his certificate. Finally, procure all advanced degrees. This will be easy since the fees for Excellence and Distinction will have been removed by the time you get this Rostrum.

Look at your chapter standing again. Are you satisfied with it? If not, then mark the place in red ink where you want the Chapter to be next year and clip that page to your bulletin board as a reminder of the goal you have set. The increased enthusiasm permeating your entire speech program resulting from the attainment of this goal will be worth many times the slight cost and effort. And if now in first or second place, look well after your honors, for where are some of the leaders of yesteryear who did not!

## Chapter Membership Record

The annual record of chapters is here published to show to what extent each is really active in speech contests and in the work of the League. It lists the total number of members and degrees enrolled by each chapter since its founding. For purposes of equitable comparison the chapters are grouped according to the years of League membership.

The figure in the first column denotes the rank within the group. The next figure indicates the change up or down since last year. The final figure denotes the total number of members and degrees enrolled

## NFL Costs Reduced

## Council Votes to Remove Two Degree Fees Secretary Negotiates Lower Insignia Prices

A modest surplus in the operating income of the League during each of the past two years has enabled the Council to take one more step to lower still further the nominal costs of NFL membership. It has voted to propose an amendment to the constitution eliminating the degree fee for the degrees of Excellence and Distinction. Ballots have been sent to all chapters and as the vote should be nearly unanimous, ratification can be assumed to be effective at the time this Rostrum is received. The fee of 50 c for the Degree of Honor remains unchanged as that degree carries with it a subscription to the Rostrum.
Excellence and Distinction Will Be Recorded Without Application

With the passage of the amend ment the national office will record the Degree of Excellence or Distinction for each member as soon as the necessary credit points are on record, provided, of course that the Degree of Honor has been obtained previously. Chap ters need no longer file applications for the two highest degrees, but are urged to file all applications for Degree of Honor promptly so that the other degrees for that member can thereafter be recorded immediately upon the acquisition of the needed credit points.

Lower Key Prices
Reductions ranging from 50c to $\$ 1.00$ in the prices of NFL student insignia have resulted from negotiations carried on by the national office this summer with the L. G.

Standard and Special Keys
The key listed as "special" is the one with which NFL members are familiar. It is three-piece, hand made and therefore more costly. For those desiring a lower priced item the "standard" key is now available. This is a one-piece die-struck key. In design it is the same as the other key, but is not as heavy.

## Keys to Be Mailed from

 National OfficeTo effect part of this reduction the national office has undertaken the task of mailing the keys ordered. It will procure the keys in lots of 100 items from the manufacturer and fill orders as received. Gold keys will be sent direct from the manufacturer on order as heretofore.

The lower prices should enable chapters to supply insignia to nearly all of the members. Nevertheless members remain free as heretofore to purchase or not to purchase keys as they decide for themselves.
