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The Editor's Notebook

Thirty-nine of the contestants at this year's tourney were also at Lexington last year, but of these only five — Fadell Hallal, Lois Miner, Fred Meyers, Kenneth Goudreau and Lance M. Liebman — have attended three tournaments or congresses.

For the second time, Oklahoma and Ohio divided all major tournament honors. Last year Oklahoma won Oratory, Boys' Extemp and Girls' Extemp; Ohio won Debate, Dramatic Interpretation and the Student Congress trophy. This year Oklahoma took the debate title, Boys' Extemp, Oratory and Student Congress trophy, while Ohio captured Girls' Extemp and Dramatics.

One of the contestants who seemed to enjoy the tournament most was Lena Ohrn, a perfectly charming young miss from Sweden who was an exchange student at Midwest City, Okla. Day after

the tournament she joined a group of other foreign students on a 30-day tour of the United States. She got to the quarter finals in Dramatic Interpretation.

A special accolade to John McCullough of Miami, Okla. Last year he won the championship in Boys' Extemp and this year he transferred his talents to Original Oratory and won it handily, with firsts in five of the six preliminary rounds.

The Sioux Falls Argus Leader gave the tournament surprisingly good space — front page picture and double column story nearly every day. The reporting was accurate, too, thanks to the conscientious and understanding efforts of Harris Simon, assigned by the paper to cover the tournament.

Three coaches who were at the first national tournament in 1931 were at Sioux Falls: Arnold E. Melzer, Sheboygan-Central, Wisconsin; Levi Osterhus, Minneapolis-Roosevelt, Minnesota; and John D. Davies, Kenosha, Wisconsin. National officers J. Edmund Mayer and Bruno E. Jacob were also at the 1931 tourney.

Setting the travel record for '58 was Robert M. Jacob, son of the national secretary, who left the atomic testing area in the Marshall Islands a few days before the contest to again assist in the tournament office in sectioning contests and tabulating results. No one could touch his record distance of 7,000 miles. Robert and his brother, Richard, are national tournament veterans.

Kenosha Wins Second Tau Kappa Alpha Trophy Dan Travanti, Mr. John D. Davies, coach; Rodger Gabrielson

Sioux Falls, South Dakota, heart of the Great Sioux Empire, famous for its sunshine and sweeping cornfields, played host to approximately 500 contestants, coaches and guests as part of the 1958 National Speech Tournament and Student Congress sponsored by the National Forensic League.

The Midwestern metropolis was laid bare by NFL'ers from North, East, South and West, as they talked their way through five days and nights of topnotch speech competition, plus four evenings of dances, barbecues and coke parties.

Contestants were welcomed to Sioux Falls by the tourney host, Washington Senior High School, and were quickly shown to their quarters at Augustana College. Memories are many, not only of the keen competition, but also of the fellowship and friendliness that make a National the success it always is.

Everyone's a Winner

"In a National Forensic League Tournament, there is no such thing as a loser," stated Senator Karl E. Mundt, President of the NFL, at the official banquet on Monday evening. Senator Mundt, speaking to coaches and guests as well as contestants, said that if he had to pick the future leaders of the country from any one group, the contestants in a National Speech Tournament would be his first choice.

Senator Mundt, as main speaker of the evening, surmised that speech training and forensic work were some of the most valuable

aids a student could develop, even as important as knowledge gained in science and mathematics. Following his speech, Sen. Mundt had to leave in order to board his plane for Washington.

Second for Kenosha

For the second time, the huge Tau Kappa Alpha trophy given for cumulative national achievement was won by Kenosha, Wisconsin. That chapter received the award in 1946 and then started a new record, piling up 232 rounds in nationals during the past twelve years.

In 22 national tournaments, 58 Kenosha contestants have appeared in 426 rounds of competition; 32 reached the finals, 13 placed third, 5 won second and 4 gained national championships. In 1948 Kenosha had two firsts, one second, and two thirds, a feat never equaled by any other school.

Two other chapters are two-time winners: Du Quoin, Iilinois,

and Classen High School of Oklahoma City, Okla.

Leading contenders for the 1959 award are Louisville, Ohio, 199; Watertown, South Dakota, 185; Seminole, Okla., 175; Elgin, Illinois, 175; Massillon, Ohio, 167; Omaha-Central, Nebraska, 163; and Muskogee, Oklahoma, 171.

Houston Wins Again

For the fourth time in six years, a Houston high school has won the sweepstakes award. This time Bellaire High ran up the impressive total of 34 rounds of national competition, closely pressed by Waco, Texas, with 33 rounds, and Watertown, South Dakota, with 31.

The winning Bellaire team consisted of John Williams and Mack Kidd in debate plus Marie Cheatham and Allan Haufrect in Dramatic Interpretation. The debate team survived till the fifth round while both Dramatic con-

testants reached the finals, placing second and fourth. Two students from Muskogee, Okla., ran up an impressive 27 rounds, both going to the finals in Extemp and to the semifinals in Debate.

The Coach-of-the-Year award was presented to Mr. Cecil Pick-ett, coach of the individual events contestants at Bellaire.

Oklahoma Sweeps Debate

Oklahoma dominated the debate scene as Seminole, Okla., defeated Sand Springs, Okla., 3-2, in the finals of the cross-examining contest. John Spiker and Jim Johns represented the winning team from Seminole which was coached by H. B. Mitchell.

Carolyn Walters and Dale Stockton composed the runnerup Sand Springs team which upheld the affirmative side of the question. Gene Kizer coached the Sand Springs team.

The final debate was closely followed by a large audience which was tense with excitement and anticipation not only from the final debate, but also from the forthcoming award announcements. The finals in debate climaxed a season in which foreign aid and economic assistance littered the tournaments and conversation across the country. As a result of reaching the finals of debate plus their competition in individual events, the four finalists placed among the top six in high point totals in the 1958 National.

Oklahoma and Ohio in Extemp

Oklahoma and Ohio took the crowns in what is usually considered the most challenging forensic event, that of boys and girls extemp. Rennard Strickland of Muskogee, Okla., annexed the boys extemp crown, closely pressed by Larry Tribe, San Francisco-Lin-

coln, Cal., and Paul Black from Calumet City, Ill. Jack Gregory coached the boys' extemp winner.

Norma Thompson of Louisville, Ohio, coached by Karl Boyle, swept to victory in the girls' division, followed by Margaret Rooney of Eliz. Seton High School, Pittsburgh, Pa., and Anne McCall of Waco, Tex. This was the second National placement for Norma, who finished third in girls' extemp last year.

Oratory Winners

John McCullough swept to victory in Original Oratory with his dissertation, "In Defense of America." Last year John won first in Boys' Extemp, thus giving him the rare distinction of being a two-time National winner.

Irving Zeretsky from San Francisco-Lowell, Calif., and Dan Travanti of Kenosha, Wisconsin, placed second and third, respectively, in Oratory. Dan also is a double winner, having placed sec-

ond in last year's Dramatic Interpretation contest.

John's coach, responsible for his remarkable success, is Robert W. Gobetz of Miami, Oklahoma.

This year a national theme was picked, "What's Right with America," and all orations centered around the topic. The system of having a central theme seemed to be very popular throughout the oratorical season. This is the first year such a system has been used.

"Bad Seed" Wins

With a selection from "Bad Seed," Karen McPeek, Euclid, Ohio, captured the Dramatic Interpretation title, followed by Allan Haufrect, Houston-Bellaire, Texas, and Jeannine Hutchings of Independence, Missouri.

Of the 35 Drama contestants, 24 were girls.

Top Scorers

As with everything else, Oklahoma and Ohio walked off with high point totals, carrying away

the first six placements. Because of particularly outstanding achievement, the following members topped the list of NFL points earned at the 1958 tournament:

Of these high scorers, only one was a repeater from last year, that being Dan Travanti of Kenosha, Wisconsin. Last year Dan scored 78 NFL points. Another high scorer this year as well as last was John McCullough with 70.

Tourney Planners

A tournament as large and as successful as the 1958 National can only be possible because of a number of individuals who are willing to dedicate themselves to the months of planning and to the tourney itself.

Radio Awards

Testing their voices and their abilities in real life situations were 65 boys and girls as they sought

the crown in Radio Announcing. Coming out on top was Roger Gabrielson of Kenosha, Wis., who was awarded the golden microphone trophy. John Williams, Houston-Bellaire, Texas, and Mary E. Beall, Lafayette, Ind., won second and third placements, respectively. The winner is coached by John Davies.

Best in Poetry

Of the 40 participants in poetry, Denise Anne Jeffries of Boulder, Colorado, was adjudged the best. Reading and interpretation of the poetry was taken into account. Carolyn White of Watertown, South Dakota, and Cynthia Curtis, Midwest City, Oklahoma, placed second and third.

One of the most important parts of a National Tournament, next to the contests themselves, is the social life during the leisure moments. And the citizenry of Sioux Falls did themselves proud when they planned this year's tournament. There were few if any leis-


Busy Day for Senator Mundt

Our honored guest, NFL President Karl E. Mundt, really had it rough on Monday. First came an address to the South Dakota convention of the American Legion at Huron, S. D.; then a flight by a special plane to Sioux Falls to address a joint meeting of Rotary and Kiwanis clubs; then an address to the joint session of the National Student Congress — the best ever given in the long series over the years; then an hour long reception for tournament students and coaches (standing in line that long isn't easy); and finally another address at the tournament banquet from which he had to leave early to board a plane for Minneapolis. A few hours of sleep followed, and then another plane ride to Washington, where he arrived shortly before the convening of the senate and the debate on the Alaskan statehood bill.

Senate Passes Four Bills

Affairs of "a government of the people, by the people and for the people" were investigated, debated and possibily altered by the 1958 Student Congress composed of twenty-six Senators and forty-three Representatives. With a cross-section of the nation represented, ideas and opinions were many, arguments and debates hot, and elections close. Top speakers, selected as outstanding by their district congresses, argued with each other before, during and after sessions for their favorite bill. National Student Congress brings out the best in student politics and oratory as each Senator or Representative votes for his favorite bill. Robert W. Scott, assistant secretary of the NFL, acted as director of the Student Congress.

Many Bills Proposed
With a total of forty bills pre-

sented by the Senate and House Representatives. everybody was certainly kept busy. However. only four bills passed both houses and were signed by Acting President I. Edmund Mayer. Legislation which passed included a resolution recommending the teaching of courses in comparative governments and economic systems in public high schools; a resolution recommending the death penalty for the illegal production or sale of narcotics; a bill extending the Reciprocal Trade Act; and a resolution recommending the closing of federal business-type establishments in competition with private business. A number of bills and resolutions proposed were lost in committees and therefore never had the chance to reach the floor of their respective house to be debated upon.

Other bills which caused interesting and spirted debate concerned withdrawal of NATO forces from Western Germany, recognition of Red China in the United Nations, and federal scholarships to secondary education.



The many "winners" expressed sentiments with comments such as "We had a great time," "I met lots of new friends here" and "I'll never forget the Nationals."
