Champions Chosen for 1967

Previous attendance records were broken as 209 schools in 38 states were represented by 350 contestants in the thirty-third National Speech Tournament. The tournament, sponsored by NFL, was held June 19-22 on the campus of David Lipscomb College in Nashville, Tenn. Included in the schedule were preliminary and final rounds of competition, recreational activities, and coaches' conferences and seminars — all culminating in the Thursday night assembly in which results were announced and awards presented.

TKA to Houston-Bellaire

The coveted Tau Kappa Alpha cumulative sweepstakes award was won by Houston-Bellaire, Texas, with 233 rounds. The award is presented to the school which has accumulated the greatest number of rounds at Nationals, scoring one per major individual event and two per debate. Once a school wins the trophy, it must begin its count again.

Bellaire's total was increased in ten National Tournaments begin-

ning in 1957. This is the first time in recent years that a school has won the trophy in so brief a time. Included in the total are seven National Championships—one each in Boys' Extemp, Girls' Extemp, Original Oratory, and the Senate of the Student Congress, and three in Dramatic Interpretation. Bellaire students also won the National Sweepstakes in 1958 and 1959, and placed second in 1960 and 1963. The dramatic students were coached by Mr. Cecil J. Pickett. Since 1962 the forensic students have been coached by Mr. Bill Henderson, and earlier, by Mrs. Mollie Martin.

Seventeen rounds, including a National Championship in Dramatic, were added by Bellaire students this year. The students, Brent Mintz, Martha Farmer, and Sandi Morgen, accepted the trophy together with Messrs. Henderson and Pickett, on behalf of all who had contributed to the point total.

Runner-up school was Lafayette-Jefferson, Indiana, with 199

Houston-Mem. Takes Stakes

With an impressive 46 rounds of competition, five students from Houston-Memorial, Texas won the Annual Sweepstakes Trophy for their school. These rounds are scored on the same basis as those for the Tau Kappa Alpha

award, but are not cumulative. This is the sixth time in 15 years that the sweepstakes trophy has been won by a Houston school.

Battle Creek-Central, Michigan was runner-up school with 39 rounds. In third place was Oklahoma City-Northwest Classen, with 36 rounds. La Habra-Lowell, California was fourth with 34.

The Memorial total includes a National Championship in Boys' Extemp, and semifinalists in both Boys' and Girls' Extemp.

Students accumulating rounds for Memorial were Lanny Smith, Michael Biggers, Melissa Maxcy, Nina Turner, and Rufus T. Wright. On the basis of their performance, Memorial coach Mr. Rex Fleming climaxed his high school teaching career by receiving an engraved silver bowl as NFL's Coach of the Year.

High Point Students

At Nashville the outstanding individual contestant was Cory Wade of Sunnyvale-Fremont, Cal., who earned 108 points during the course of the tournament. Cory's total represents a first place in Girls' Extemp and six rounds of Debate.

The second highest total was 104 points, earned by Lyndon Smith of Columbia-Dreher, S.C., with a first place in Debate and five rounds of Original Oratory. Karen Marshall of Seminole, Okla. was third with 93 points, reflecting sixth place in Girls' Extemp and six rounds of Debate. All three point leaders had attended Nationals at least once before.

Mary Alice McKeen and Kathleen Fitzgerald of St. Brendan's N. Y. were runners-up. They were coached by Mr. John Sexton.

Both teams in the final round had received earlier losses, Dreher to St. Thomas Aquinas, N.H. in round four and St. Brendan's to New Trier East, Ill. in round two.

In the final debate, the affirmative argued that military assistance was unnecessary and that it provoked governmental and popular resentment. The negative claimed that these harms were minimal and that military assistance was needed in light of ongoing aggression and subversion. The close final round vote climaxed a nearly even split of decisions throughout the tournament. The affirmative won 50.7% of the debates.

Semi-final teams were Mike Grace and Rick Nicholas from La Habra-Lowell, California, and John Smelser and Steve Kalmon from Oklahoma City-Northwest Classen. The final debate was

chaired by Supt. H. B. Mitchell of Seminole, Oklahoma.

Individual Events

No consistent judging pattern emerged in this year's individual events. In Boys' Extemp and Dramatic Interpretation the results were the most decisive in recent years; in Girls' Extemp and Original Oratory the results were close. The winners of Boys' and Girls' Extemp were veterans of a previous National Tournament; those in Oratory and Dramatic were not.

The final rounds were chaired by Mrs. ZaZelle Gifford, Oklahoma City-Harding, in Dramatic; Mrs. Margaret Sprinkle, Miami-Norland, Fla., in Original Oratory; Miss Donna P. Miller, Omaha-Central, Neb., in Boys' Extemp; and Mr. Louis H. Banker, Ft. Osage HS, Mo., in Girls' Extemp.

Boys' Extemp

All five finalists in Boys' Extemp discussed international affairs. Analysis of the question, "Is the Iron Curtain Rusting Away?" won the event for Rufus T. Wright of Houston-Memorial, Texas. Tim, who received first place from all five judges in the final round and won by a twelve-point margin, discussed the implications of increasing East-West economic and political ties and of mutual troop cuts in Europe.

Second place was won by William Durston of Sunnyvale-Fremont, Cal., who spoke on "Nassers' Effect on Egypt." With the topic, "Should the United States Expand Trade with Communist Countries?" James Conley of Battle Creek, Mich. took third.

The remaining speakers discussed the effect on the United

Nations of the Middle East crisis and the possible obsolescence of NATO. Finals in both Boys' and Girls' Extemp were cross-examination style.

Girls' Extemp

With a speech on "Automobile Safety Standards," Cory Wade of Sunnyvale-Fremont, Cal. won the year's closest event. Cory suggested possible improvement in production and inspection standards for automobiles. She placed second in Girls' Extemp last year.

Only two points behind Cory was Wendy Zomparelli of Grossmont, Cal., speaking on "How Has Rhodesian Independence Affected Great Britain?" Third place was won by Jane Starsnic of St. Francis Academy, Pa., who spoke on "Nasser's Effect on Egypt."

The other three finalists spoke on the 1968 elections — chances of Democratic victory, chances of Republican victory, and the impact of Alabama's George Wal-

lace. Extemp preparation for both boys and girls was supervised by Supt. H. B. Mitchell, Seminole, Okla.; Prin. Glenn E. Burnette, Topeka, Kansas; and Miss Donna P. Miller, Omaha-Central, Neb.

Original Oratory

Subject matter in the Oratory finals ranged from the highly individual to the universal. First place went to Shelley Long of Ft. Wayne-Southside, Ind., whose title was **The Sex Perversion Weed**. She stressed the need for sex education in the schools, arguing that teachers and parents were ready for such a program.

Winning second place for the second straight year was Brent Simmons of Battle Creek, Mich., who spoke on **The Tragedy of Black Power**. Jeff Brown of Grossmont, Cal. was third with an oration entitled **Relevancy and Change**.

Other orations in finals were **Will You Buy It?, A Dream or a**

Dramatic Interpretation

Four distinct types of literature were represented in the Dramatic finals this year. First place went to Brent Mintz of Houston-Bellaire, Texas, whose selection was from Elia Kazan's **America America**. Brent is Bellaire's third Dramatic champion, following Alan Haufrect in 1959 and Camille Waters in 1964. He won by a ten-point margin.

In second place was Doug Hill from Clay HS, Lexington, Kentucky. Doug interpreted a cutting from Dylan. Luanne Schedeen of Greham, Oregon placed third with a cutting from **The Rain Maker**. The remaining selection in finals was from **Four on a Health**.

Radio and Impromptu

Radio Announcing and Impromptu Speaking are offered each year as consolation events. There is no prior qualification; contestants may enter only after being eliminated from both of their major events. They are dropped upon receiving one down.

Radio Announcing was won this year by Nancy Adams of Arsenal Technical HS, Indianapolis, Ind., who survived two rounds each in Dramatic and Oratory. Jim Blomstrom of Youngstown-Boardman, Ohio placed second. The contest was chaired by Mr. Vernon W. Metz, of North Hills HS, Pittsburgh, Pa.

Michael Biggers of Houston-Memorial, Texas won the contest in Impromptu Speaking. He entered after lasting four rounds each

National for 1968 Approved

The Committee on National Contests and Activities of the National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed the National Speech Tournament and Student Congress on its Approved List for 1967-68.

A Senate Journal

The National Student Congress, operating as a unicameral body, met this year in the Tennessee State Capitol. Activity began Monday morning with an opening session and committee meetings, followed by three full days of legislative debate. By the time the week was out, the Senate had passed two pieces of legislation and considered four others.

Passed was a bill legalizing therapeutic abortions, which was introduced by Sen. Michael Ingram of Elkhart, Ind. Sen. William Baum of Ft. Logan-Mullen, Colo., was the author of the other successful measure. It was a resolution authorizing the Federal government to make contributions, in equal amounts, to all political parties sponsoring candidates for the United States Senate or House, or for President of the United States.

Measures Considered

The Senate also considered a resolution asking that the United States refrain from unilateral intervention in Latin American disputes, a resolution that the United States grant diplomatic recognition to Rhodesia, a resolution requiring the Federal government to return a portion of its annual revenue to the States, and a resolution revamping the present Universal Military Training and Service Act. Observers reported that the resolution reforming the draft occasioned the most heated debate.

In the concluding session, the Senate voted a resolution of thanks to the State of Tennessee for use of the State Capitol and its facilities, and voted honorary membership to Lieutenant-Governor

nor Gorrell for his part in the Congress proceedings.

Congress Trophy

Each year a Student Congress Trophy is awarded on a cumulative basis similar to that for the Tau Kappa Alpha tournament trophy. Points are given on a scale keyed to the nature and extent of students' participation. This year the trophy was won by Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, who added 3 rounds this year to a previous 36, taking the award with 39. The trophy was accepted by Thomas Lackey, Senator in this year's Congress, and by his coach, Mr. Richard A. Whalen.

The Tournament Week Reviewed

For the Tennessee District Committee, tournament action began long before the week of June 19. Arrangements were coordinated by Miss Anne White, Nashville - Overton, chairman; Mrs. B. H. Eldridge, Madison; Mrs. Ruby Krider, Paris; and Mr. Robert H. Woodland, Clarksville. Dr. Jerry Henderson of the Speech Department of David Lipscomb College served as general tournament chairman.

Finding sufficient funds to operate was not an agonizing task this year, because of the generosity of Life and Casualty Insurance Company of Nashville, which sponsored the tournament. No account of Nationals would be complete without the expression of NFL's deep appreciation to Life and Casualty and to Guilford Dudley, company president.

Local judges were available in sufficient quantity because of the recruiting and dispatching work of Mrs. Krider and Mrs. Richard Corley of Nashville. Mr. Woodland performed the same tasks in securing timekeepers. The coaches' lounge was kept attractive and stocked with refreshments by Mrs. Irene Zurla, Nashville-Litton, and Miss Freda Kenner, Memphis-Messick, hospitality co-chairmen.

Public arrangements for the tournament were handled by Mrs. Alice Ewing of Nashville-Central. Mrs. Vivian Collier of Nashville-Howard and Mrs. Kathryn Pugh of Nashville-Maplewood similarly handled recreation planning. Participants needing transportation were especially appreciative of the work of Mr. Steve Hewlett, Antioch, Tenn., and Mr. Jim Sterling, Nashville-Overton, who

served as transportation co-chairmen.

Particularly praiseworthy is the work of the many Tennessee students who served as guides, answered telephones, ran messages, and in other seemingly small but very significant ways contributed to the smooth operation of the tournament.

In addition to the recreational facilities at Lipscomb, which were made available to NFL guests, many activities were planned. Upon arrival Sunday evening, a pizza party was scheduled for contestants and a buffet dinner for coaches.

Dr. Athens Clay Pullias, president of Lipscomb, welcomed participants at the Monday opening assembly. Greetings on behalf of Metropolitan Nashville were extended by Mr. Joe Torrance, Director of Financial Affairs.

The Monday night banquet, held in the Municipal Auditorium downtown, was under the supervision of Mrs. Betty Simmons, Nashville-Hillsboro. Free records were given to all attending, compliments of the Columbia Record Company. Nashville's fame as recording center second only to New York was further celebrated in a special 30-minute program of country music, presented with compliments of WLAC-TV.

At the banquet, recognition was given District Chairmen and Diamond Key Coaches. Bronze, silver, and gold Chairman awards were presented. A special presentation was made by National Secretary Bruno E. Jacob to Mr. Mr. Henry Symons, retiring after 40 years as NFL coach at Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Featured speaker at the banquet was Ray Bushy of Life and Casualty, who discussed the importance of speech training to leadership in business and management.

Speech seminars for coaches were held on Wednesday morning. The early seminar considered persistent problems in oral interpretation, such as choice of selection, relation of selection to audience, and appropriateness of movement. Panelists were Mrs. ZaZelle Gifford, Oklahoma City-Harding; Mrs. Dora Heintz, Cleveland Heights, Ohio; and Mrs. Myrna C. Ishimoto, Honolulu-Radford, Hawaii.

At the other seminar, problems in understanding criminal investigation procedures were discussed by Prof. Nathaniel E. Gozansky of the Vanderbilt Law School; Gilbert E. Merritt, Jr., U.S. Attorney, Nashville; and Prof. Randall M. Fisher, Director of Forensics at Vanderbilt. The seminars were arranged and moderated by Mr. Frank Sferra, Mullen HS, Ft. Logan, Colo., under the auspices of the Speech Association of America.

The Thursday concluding assembly was chaired by Miss Carmendale Fernandes of Sunnyvale-Fremont, Cal. Special awards were presented to David Lipscomb College, the Tennessee District Committee, and Dr. Jerry Henderson as tokens of appreciation for hospitality extended NFL.

Top honors in longevity this year went to Independence-Chrisman, Mo., for whom Nashville was the 26th National. One-fourth of the schools at Nashville were present for their first National.

The Coaches' Conference

NFL coaches this year chose to express their views on a wide number of issues. During their conference the coaches:

Discussed again the possibility of selecting the debate topic a full year in advance. Proponents argued such a procedure would give NFL a greater voice in topic selection; opponents felt it would "usurp the prerogatives" of the NUEA.

Urged repeal of the 300-mile travel rule as being vague, unnecessary, and counterproductive.

Raised the possibility of setting a national standard regarding extent of participation in the District Tournament which might be necessary for a school to retain its charter. This discussion was inconclusive.

Complained about alleged inconsistencies in rules regarding eligibility of state winners. Some coaches argued that exceptions to the "final round only" rule were being granted in some states and not others.

Strongly supported a proposal that no future changes in National Tournament eligibility rules take effect in the middle of a school year, but that they be delayed until the following September.

Discussed the problem of original orations that present a fictitious narrative as though it were real. Coaches generally felt that this device, though of significant persuasive value, violated the speaker's ethical responsibility of honesty to his audience, and that speakers who use such a device should at some point inform the audience of the fictitious nature of the narrative.

Questioned why the point scale should require that the last 50 contest points be earned in Extemp Speaking.

Considered changing the basis of National Tournament operations from double-elimination to a set number of preliminary rounds followed by eliminations. No specific proposal was suggested.

Suggested the possibility of adding a fifth day to Nationals to accommodate increased tournament size and to permit decreased pressure in scheduling.

The actions taken by the conference are only advisory, but are always considered carefully by the Executive Council.

Amendments Ratified

All five amendments to the NFL Constitution submitted to the chapters last May have been ratified. Listed below are the vote totals, with the figures in parentheses representing the number of schools voting as indicated.

All amendments become effective October 1, 1967, and apply to all reports and applications recorded thereafter, regardless of the date on which contests were actually held or membership applications initiated. Schools wishing to submit records under the old system must do so by September 30.

Amending Art. IV, Sec. B: To create a new contest category for Other Speech Contests and to make other changes as set forth in the published schedule.

Special awards also be made available by the Digest to outstanding NFL coaches.

Those attending registered approval of these proposals with thunderous applause and a standing ovation.

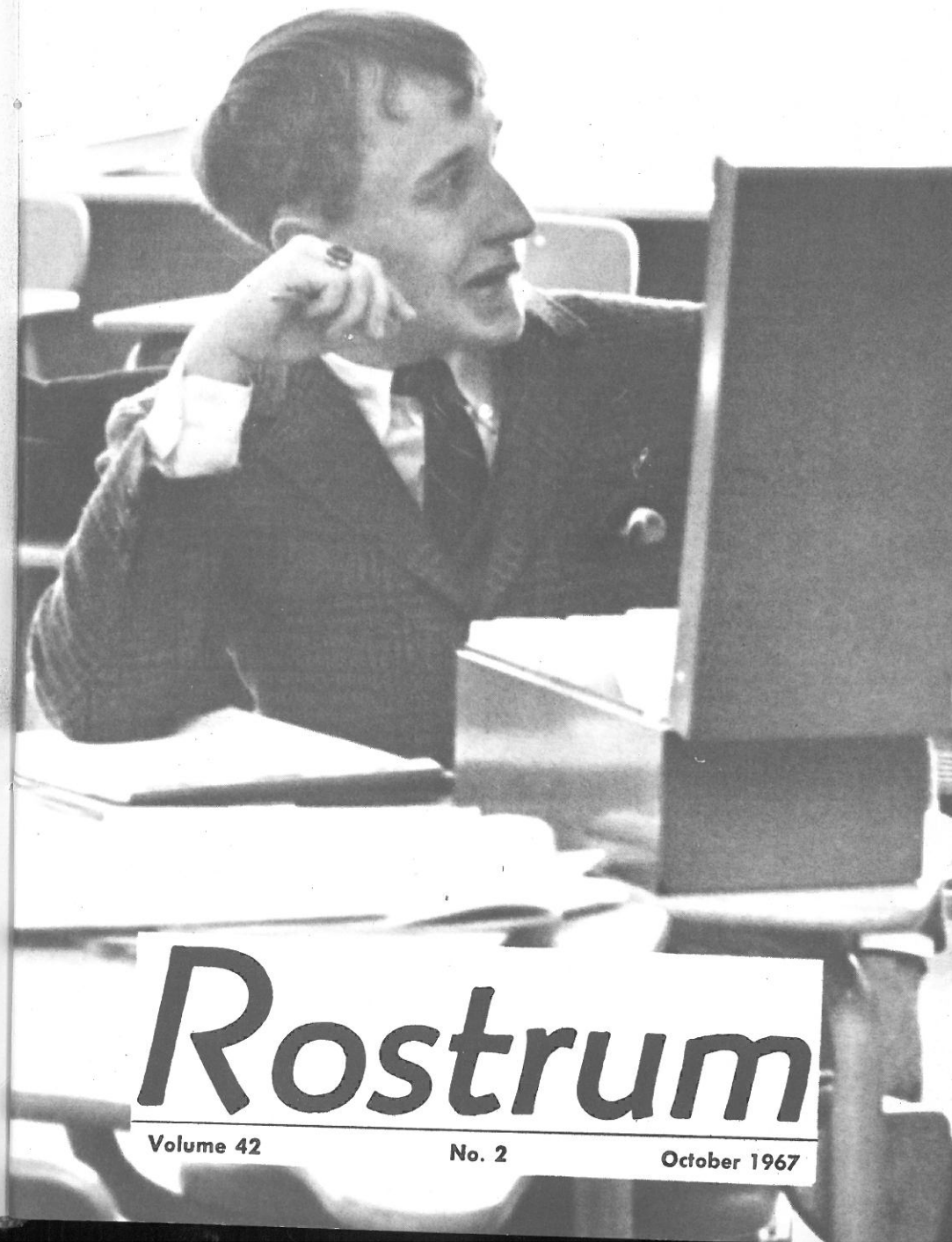
