Champions Chosen in Kansas Tournament

232 schools and 407 students were present at the thirty-sixth Speech Tournament, National sponsored by The Reader's Digest Foundation and under the direction of The National For-The tournament ensic League. was held June 16-19 at Shawnee Mission-South High School in Overland Park, Kansas. Included in the schedule were a dance for the contestants and a reception for the coaches on Monday eve-The tournament banquet was held at the Glenwood Manor Motor Inn on June 16. District Chairmen were presented their gold, silver, and bronz awards. Mr. James F. Hawker, Lafayette-Jefferson HS, Indiana was presented a gift from the NFL on becoming the second coach to fourth diamond. Miss earn a Margaret Meridth. Independence-Chrisman, Missouri given a plaque signifying her attainment of the third diamond. On Wednesday a coaches conference was held in the auditor-

ium of Shawnee Mission-South High School. On Thursday a conference on the debate question was held. Mr. Calvin Heintz, Cleveland Heights High School, Ohio and chairman of the NUEA Committee on Discussion and Debate Wording Committee presided. The tournament ended Friday night, June 19. Final results and some awards were made.

TKA to Houston-Memorial

The Tau Kappa Alpha cumulative sweepstakes award was won by Memorial High School, Houston, Texas. The TKA is presented to the school which has the greatest number of rounds at the National Tournament, scoring one point per major individual event and two per debate. Once a school wins the trophy it must begin its count again.

Memorial's total was amassed in 8 trips to the National Tournament. Included in the total are two championships in Girls' Extemp, one in Boys' Extemp, a second in both Boys' and Girls' Extemp, a third in Original Oratory, and a fifth in debate. Memorial received the Outstanding Chapter Award in 1969. Memorial received its Charter in 1963 and has qualified for the National Tournament each year since obtaining a charter.

Fourteen rounds were added by Memorial students this year for a total of 201 rounds of National Participation. The students were Patti Nommensen and Patti Biggers. Their coaches Miss Mary K. Weige and Mr. Rex Fleming were present. They were presented the TKA trophy by Mr. Bill Henderson, Houston-Bellaire, whose school received the award in 1967.

Sweepstakes to Houston-Bellaire, Texas

Houston-Bellaire students won

the Annual Sweepstakes for their school by participating in 40 rounds of competition. Sweepstakes points are awarded on the same basis as the Tau Kappa Alpha award, but are not cummulative. Whitmer High School, Toledo, Ohio was runner-up with 35 rounds, Norland High School, Miami, Florida third with 34 rounds, and Bishop Amat High School, La Puente, California fourth with 31 rounds.

Accumulating rounds for Houston-Bellaire this year were Mei Su Teng, Nonya Schwartz, Scott Sommers, Steve Weil, and Robert Meadows. They were coached by Miss June Smith and Mr. Bill Henderson. Houston-Bellaire won the sweepstakes trophy in 1958 and 1959. Mr. Henderson received an engraved silver tray as NFL's Coach of the Year.

High Point Students

High point student at the 1970 tournament was Susan Williams, Palos Verdes, California with 119 points. Susan placed first in Girls' Extemp and participated in six rounds of debate. Second was Michael McCormack of Yankton, South Dakota who earned 116 points, and third with 112 points was Mei Su Teng of Houston-Bellaire, Texas.

Four boys survived the semifinals to compete for the National Championship. Samuel Justice, Logansport, Indiana took the second spot by discussing "School busing." Samuel was coached by Mr. B. J. Siefert. Bill Lunn, coached by Mrs. Joan Murray, Muskogee-Central High School, Oklahoma, spoke on "College draft deferments to place third. Jody Burnett Logan-Utah was coached by Mr. Weston G. Henri. Jody chose Welfare Payments to take fourth place in the National Tournament. The final round of Boys' and Girls' Extempt is cross-examination style.

Using the broad area of "Cambodia" Linda Listrom, coached by Mr. A. C. Eley, Topeka High School, Kansas, placed third. Miss Carmendale Fernandes coached Terri Davis, Fremont High School, Sunnyvale, California who discussed "Ecology and economy" to place fourth in the National Tournament.

Radio and Impromptu

Each year Radio Announcing and Impromptu Speaking are of-

fered as consolation events. There are no prior qualifications: contestants may enter only after being eliminated from their primary and secondary events. They are dropped upon receiving one down.

Pete Williams, Natrona County High School, Casper, Wyoming and coached by Mr. William Thompson won the Radio event. Mark Washofsky who attends Acadiana High School, Lafayette, Louisiana placed second.

Gene Alesandrini of Pekin, Illinois and coached by Mr. Douglas Springer took first place in Impromptu speaking. Michael Higlin of Damien High School, LaVerne, California was second.

NFL National Congress - 1970

Any adult who has lost confidence in the Young People of today should have the experience of scoring a National Forensic League Student Congress. thirty-one young men (there were no female senators) who participated in the 1970 National Congress were excellent examples of the concientious, concerned youth of our nation. For three and a half days they wrestled with the pros and cons of questions like: abolishment of military courts; withdrawal of military personnel from S.E. Asia; betterment of conditions for the American Indians; stablization of the population of the United States: taxation of non-profit organizations; strengthening of the executive, legislative and judicial powers of the UNITED NATIONS: right to strike by public employees; repealment of the present fault auto insurance with no-faul auto insurance; and retainment of student military deferments. As one listened to the evidence presented by the young men, he could not help being struck by the great amount of research which they had done on all questions. fact, there were so many excellent, enthusiastic speakers that all the scorers remarked that they found it difficult to decide which individuals were outstanding at the end of each legislative day.

The first half day was a little difficult for every one since it became immediately evident that many states are not operating their local congresses strickly according to NFL rules. After the opening session some senators remarked, "They sure do things differently in Kansas." This, however, was not the case since

"things" were being done according to the NFL Congress Manual. Coaches would make available more time for debate on bills in future national congresses if students were forced to follow the MANUAL in local congresses. There were some few senators who sought to confuse by parliamentary manipulation. While a knowledge of parliamentary know-how is important, it is not the real reason for a congress and should never be regarded as such.

I have always been an enthusiastic supporter of student congresses: I am now more than ever convinced that this is the best practical training high school coaches can give their students since it teaches them to research, to think, and to speak. I am hopeful that we can again find some way to have a National House of Representatives in addition to a National Senate.

The 1970 National Student Congress was called to Order on Tuesday morning June 16, by speaker pro tem Calvin J. Karlin, Nickerson High School, Hutchinson, Kansas.

A record of nine pieces of legislation was passed by the Student Senators. The final action before adjournment was a resolution to send the passed legislation to various members of the 91st Congress of the United States and the President.

The Student Congress Trophy, similar to the Tau Kappa Alpha tournament award was awarded to Canton-Lehman HS, Ohio with 39 points.

Judges of each Congress session submit nominees for superior senators. The Senate itself narrows this list to six, and from that group elects by secret ballot a Most Outstanding Senator.
